GREAT STRIKE HAS BEEN DECLARED

Employees on All Railways in Great Britain and Ireland Called Out.

London, Aug. 17.—Industrial war has been declared and employees of all railways in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland will be called out at once.

London, Aug. 17.—The time limit of twenty-four hours within which the striking railroad employees demanded that the employers agree to consider their grievances expired at 8 o'clock this morning, but the threatened general strike did not materialize. Representatives of the men instead went to a conference with the Board of Trade. Traffic at Liverpool is maintained, but the stations are guarded by soldiers with fixed bayonets. Trains to and from Manchester are generally suspended.

JUDGE FREEMAN WANTS VALUATION

Asks for Authority to Issue Bonds on Basis of \$35,167,000 Valuation of I. & G. N. R. R.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 17.—President Freeman of the International & Great Northern railroad is here today to file a formal application with the state railroad commission for a valuation of the reorganized road. He said he would ask for a valuation of \$35,167,000. The bonds have already been sold, he said, and all progress hinges on the commission's action upon his application.

COL. JAKE WOLTERS STAR WITNESS TODAY

Said He Collected All the Money He Could for Campaign Purposes. Said Letters Submitted by Cone Johnson Were Stolen from His Room.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 17.—Col. Jake Wolters came to Austin from New York today and appeared before the house election investigating committee. He read his testimony from a lengthy written statement. He told in this statement of his work against submission in 1908 and against prohibition in the recent campaign. As chairman of the anti-state committee, he says, he "collected all the money possible to defray the expenses of the campaign and would have collected more if it had been possible." He did not know how much was collected.

In February, 1909, according to Colonel Wolters' statement, his room in the Driskill Hotel at Austin was "entered by a burglar" and the two letters recently submitted by Cone Johnson, with other papers, were stolen. Mr. Johnson explained that these letters were given to him by someone whose name he promised not to reveal.

Colonel Wolters set forth in his statement that he denied the authority of the committee to conduct an investigation. He declared every dollar spent by him during the campaign was spent lawfully. He further declared that "no voter or official was corrupted or sought to be corrupted."

Following the reading of the statement Colonel Wolters was placed on the stand. He gave an account of the organization of the anti forces to defeat statewide prohibition.

Lime Light on Senate Committee.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 17.—The senate investigating committee turned the light on itself this morning. Chairman Vaughan said his expenses were paid while speaking for prohibition, but he received no other pay during the campaign. Senator Warren and Hon. Cullen F. Thomas testified that they received no pay nor expense money, but contributed to the campaign fund. Senator McNeal said he received pay for advertising from both sides, but made no speeches. Senator Terrell was being grilled most of the day.
