### A. AND M. ALUMNUS HONORED

Sam J. Fountain Elected to American Institute of Architects.

Sam J. Fountain, an alumnus of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, now instructor in architecture and architectural engineering at that institution, has been elected a member of the American Institute of Architects, the highest professional organization in America. Mr. Fountain has just received notification of his election. Of both members and associate members Texas numbers only five.

Mr. Fountain's election comes in recognition of both his scholarship and work. Recently he submitted a large exhibit of architectural work, and this was passed on by the examination committee, composed of the Nation's biggest architects.

Mr. Fountain was a member of the senior class in civil engineering at A. and M. in 1901. He then went to the University of Illinois, graduating there in architecture. In 1906 he went to Paris, where he remained three years in the National French School of Architecture. He returned to America in 1908, establishing offices in Cleveland, O. He designed the First Christian Church at Canton, O., one of the largest churches in the United States. Since last September he has been instructor in architecture and architectural engineering at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.
