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#### SPEAKER TERRELL.

A comparatively young man named Chester Terrell, an anti-prohibitionist, managed to get himself elected speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, the majority of whose members are prohibitionists.

Each member related in verse her experience in making the dollar materialize, and these recitals afforded entertainment, the verses being really excellent. Only one member confessed that she had exercised her woman's


privilege and appropriated the dollar from her husband's pocket.
