WOMEN SUFFRAGE BLOCKED

DEMOCRATS REFUSED TO REPORT RULE CREATING STANDING COMMITTEE—REPUBLICANS AND PROGRESSIVES FAVOR INVESTIGATING STRIKE.

Washington, Jan. 17.—The Democrats' House rules committee refused to report the rule creating a standing committee on women suffrage. They also refused to order Congressional investigations of the copper mine and Colorado strikes. The Republicans and Progressives favored the investigations.

SMALL POX REPORTED.

While on an inspecting tour of the negro part of the town, City Health Officer Hunnicutt discovered a case of what the negroes said was chicken-pox, but upon investigation turned out to be a bad case of small pox. Upon further investigation four other cases of the same chicken-pox were discovered, but three had recovered and were walking around.

The houses where the cases were discovered were quarantined and will be fumigated and every precaution taken to keep the disease from spreading. Dr. Hunnicutt asks that every person in town be careful where they send their clothes to be washed, as this is one of the simplest and most common ways to catch the disease.

TEN THOUSAND UNACCOUNTED FOR

Fleeing Persons Protect Lives From Lava by Boards Over Heads. Woman Insane.

Tokio, Japan, Jan. 17.—Ten thousand of Kagoshima's population are still unaccounted for since the earthquake. Searchers expect to find some of these missing alive in the neighboring villages. Refugees from the island of Sakura say the only way they saved their lives, while running for shelter after the eruption began, was by holding boards over their heads to ward off stones as they ran for shelter. Huge rocks belched up by the volcano practically blocked the way from the island to Osumi. Many new hills appeared on the island. Fifteen hundred of the two thousand houses were burned. Professor Omeri today saw a woman on this island shore, but when he spoke to her she fled wildly into the interior, insane.

Blue Jackets Rescue Natives.
