STATEMENT FROM

JORDAN T. LAWLER

States His Position Relative to Furnishing Current for the Bryan-College Interurban.

Bryan, Texas, Feb. 6, 1914.

To the Public:

On the 28th ult. there appeared in the Eagle as a news item a report purporting to be the transactions of a meeting of the Commercial Club on the night preceding. This report stated that the meeting had been largely attended (?) and by innuendo charged the Bryan Power Company with being unwilling to assist in the electrification of the College Interurban. The claim apparently being put forth that the Power Company refused to agree to furnish power for the proposed electrification.

In direct refutation thereto herewith follows a copy of contract for power offered the Interurban by the city of Bryan and the power company, and refused by former. This refusal was based on the claim advanced by Mr. O. E. Gammill, vice president and general manager of the Interurban, that it would be necessary that he be furnished with a maximum V. K. A. capacity to handle one to three cars one hundred H. P. each.

The terms of this contract were drawn up in conformity with the advice of electrical engineers of unquestionable competency, and were liberal to the Interurban, giving them sufficient power for all practical purposes, and at the same time protecting the light and power consumers on the city's circuit.

The council under which this contract was tendered the Interurban were of the opinion, and were joined in this by the power company, that the citizens and tax payers having burdened themselves with a thirty-year tax, that they might be given municipal electric light service, were first to be considered. Good service to the public must not be jeopardized in any contract entered into with the Interurban.

Since its refusal of the contract in question the Interurban management has never substituted or proposed any contract wherein the interest of the public was to be protected.

As to what the Interurban has proposed the writer will take this phase of the matter up at a later date. In the meantime he suggests that Mr. Gammill inform the public as to how he would finance the purchase (by Gammill) of the power plant.

Proposed Contract.

Agreement to be entered into by and between the city of Bryan, Texas, by its mayor and secretary, with the approval of the board of council-

men, hereinafter called party of the first part, and Bryan-College Interurban Railway Company, by its vice president, general manager, and secretary, hereinafter called party of the second part.

Witnesseth:
By the terms of this agreement the party of the first part agrees to furnish to the party of the second part delivered at or near the car barn of the party of the second part or such other point as may be designated, provided that the distance from the power plant to said point shall not exceed 2,000 feet, alternating current power for use in a motor generator set for the purpose of generating with said generating set, direct current to be used in the operation of electric cars by the said party of the second part on rails within or without the city of Bryan, and for lighting Dellwood Park.

It is understood and agreed that by the terms of lighting of Dellwood Park is meant electric current for the illuminating of the grounds of the said park and the lighting of such buildings of entertainment as may be now or hereafter located thereon. Provided further that the maximum amount of current for the said purposes shall not exceed the maximum in load or more than 15 K. W.'s, and that no residence shall now or hereafter be illuminated or furnished with current for any purposes whatsoever, and that the current used in this part shall be limited for the purpose as stated herein, and for no other purposes.

The party of the second part hereby obligated itself and is limited to the installation of equipment to convert alternating current or to manufacture or produce direct current by use of rotary converters or motors, generator sets to such standard equipment as that furnished by the following named firms, to-wit: General Electric Company, Western Electric Company, Crocker-Wheeler Company, and Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, and such equipment must be first approved by the party of the first part before being installed and put in to operation.

Party of the second part agrees that it will not demand of and is limited to demand of the party of the first part current in greater quantities than necessary to operate a 100 K. W. motor generator set or rotary converter at an overload of 25 per cent.

Party of the second part is also limited and agrees to install motors of no greater total capacity than 75 H. P. in any one single car to be operated on its line.

Party of the first part agrees to furnish party of the second part current for 18 hours per day, or more at the option of the party of the first part, but the party of the first part is not to be held liable for non-failure to fur-

nish current through breakage or other unavoidable cause where a complete or partial shut down from the power plant from whence it derives its current becomes necessary.

The consideration to be paid party of the first part by party of the second part for the performance of duty and delivery of current as named in this contract shall be as follows:
For the first 5,000 K. W. H.'s three cents; for the next 5,000 two and one-half cents; for the next 5,000 two and one-fourth cents, and for the next 5,000 and thereafter two cents.

The party of the first part will furnish a meter for the measurement of this current, and the current is to be alternating, of 2,300 volts.

All bills for current furnished the party of the second part to be rendered by the party of the first part on or before the 5th day of each month, payment to be within five days after the rendering of said bill.

The terms of this contract hereby limits it to _____ years, subject to a renewal for _____ years, provided notice shall have been furnished to the party of the first part by the party of the second part six months before the date of its expiration.
