Some time during Saturday night or early Sunday morning Will Lee, colored, was shot and killed, supposedly by his brother, Adam Lee. The trouble was simply a drunken row with a woman at the bottom of it. A shotgun was used and Will probably never knew what struck him. Adam has been in hiding since, but there is hardly any likelihood of his escaping permanently. The remains of the dead negro were taken to Plantersville for burial. The fight occurred on the Templeman farm in Brazos County—Navasota Examiner.

Sheriff Conlee went to the scene of the killing and made an investigation, finding the main facts to be about as above outlined. The slayer took his father's horse immediately after the killing and made his escape.

**INTERURBAN CAR COMING.**

Information was received in Bryan today by the management of the Bryan & Central Texas Interurban Railroad Company that the first of their passenger cars was shipped from California this morning, accompanied by a messenger to keep it rolling this way. It is expected to arrive in two weeks and will be used over the H. & T. C. tracks in handling the crowds at the A. & M. commencement. It has a seating capacity of eighty-four, is 150 horse power, and has an elegant appearance, and is an improvement over anything of its kind now doing service in the State.
