MERIDIAN ROAD BOOSTERS HERE

Delegation Arrived Day Late and Given Reception by Bryan's Business Men.

Although twenty-four hours behind their schedule, the party touring Texas in the interest of this division of the Meridian road, accompanied by Colonel A. L. Westgard, vice president and director of the Transcontinental Highway of the National Highways Association, of New York, arrived in Bryan yesterday afternoon and were met by Secretary McKnight of the Commercial Club and shown the usual courtesy.

An informal meeting was held immediately after their arrival and for two hours the party told the Bryan men of their trip and what the Meridian road meant to the people of Texas.

In the party were D. E. Colp, president Meridian Road (Texas division), of San Antonio; W. H. Beck, secretary, Fort Worth; C. B. Munday, Marlin; Colonel A. L. and James Westgard of the National Highways Association, of New York City.

Mr. Colp was called upon and spoke to the meeting principally upon what the Meridian road would mean to the people, the proposed route, length, etc., and how counties would get the road. He discussed at length how other counties were building roads throughout the State, and discouraged the special tax system, claiming the forty-year bond, maturing annually, the popular plan. He advised in every case an advisory board to act with the commissioners in the discharge of their road building duty, and urged the necessity of a competent engineer. Mr. Colp was encouraged over the prospects through the territory he

had traveled and believed Bryan was rightly situated and would be on the route.

Colonel Westgard made a few remarks, stating that his business was merely to log the route and make recommendations.

W. H. Beck, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Fort Worth, told how they were building roads in Tarrant County and in other sections.

C. B. Munday of Marlin was in the party, having fallen in love with these genial gentlemen and followed them away from his home town. He told the meeting what was happening in Falls County in the way of road building. He pledged his services to Brazos and asked the co-operation of our progressive citizens in putting his county on the map.

The party left at 4:30 in the afternoon and immediately after the meeting for Navasota, where they spent the night. They were met here and piloted in by a citizen of Navasota.

The meeting instructed Secretary McKnight to make application to the Meridian Highway Association for membership, which was immediately done.

LEWIS LOCK DEAD.

Lewis Lock died at the Bryan Hospital this afternoon at 1:45 o'clock after a very brief and severe attack of appendicitis. He will be buried tomorrow afternoon from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cy Koozts of Zack, interment in Bickham cemetery, under auspices of the Knights of Pythias Lodge. A more extended notice will appear later.

CADET OSCAR S. GRAY MADE HIGHEST A. & M. RECORD

In Cadet Oscar S. Gray, son of George L. Gray, grocer, Terrell is furnishing the highest ranking junior for the year 1914-15 at the A. & M. College of Texas. According to the promotion list, which has just been issued by the commandant of cadets, Lieutenant Levi G. Brown, Gray will act as regimental sergeant major of the cadet corps next scholastic year. That is the highest office that can be held by a junior, Gray being a member of the class of 1916.

Gray was born and reared in Terrell, receiving his education in the public schools of that city. He enrolled in the engineering school at the A. & M. College in September of 1912. The following year he changed his course, taking up the study of agriculture. The first year of his career at A. & M., Gray was distinguished in his studies. Since that time he has made good grades, his marks being above 75 in all work. Last year Gray held the rank of corporal and his promotion this year comes as the result of faithfulness to duty in military and scholastic work.

Gray is one of the army of students at the A. & M. College who are working their way through school. As a part of his education he included a thorough course in stenography at a commercial college and he is rendering himself self-supporting by work in that field. Of the 570 students enrolled at A. & M. last year more than half contributed something to their own expenses.

Terrell is always well represented at the college. There were five boys registered from that city during the past session and Kaufman County contributed twelve students. The boys from that county have made good records and have established the reputation of being good, thoroughgoing students.

The book was published by the State expert printer at Austin and 7,000 copies are available for distribution.
