The fact of the matter is, I had been with my husband on numerous occasions and had many good times with him. On such occasions people would tease him about his many girls and hint that the doctor was a regular devil. I simply made up my mind to find out the truth. People often said to him in my presence: 'You have a cinch, doctor. You can go out at all hours of the night; you have an office where no one can see what's going on and what you are doing,' and so I put in the telephone device."

HUERTA AND THE PRICE OF PEACE

SAID WHEN HE WENT IN HE RESOLVED TO HAVE PEACE, COST WHAT IT MAY—HE HAD PAID THE PRICE, THE PRESIDENCY, AND HOPED IT WAS COMING.

[By Associated Press] Puerto, Mex., July 18.—Huerta said on arrival here: "When I assumed the Presidency, I said I would restore peace, cost what it may. I have paid it. It has cost me the Presidency to restore peace, my whole ambition, and I hope it is coming." He announced he was going to Europe until Mexico needs him.

GOES ON GERMAN SHIP.

[By Associated Press] Puerto, Mex., July 18.—It was announced this morning that Huerta will leave here on the German cruiser Dresden with only Gen. Blanquet accompanying him. It was also said the Dresden would go to Jamaica, notwithstanding Huerta's own statement that he was going to Europe.

ARRANGING FOR PEACE.

[By Associated Press] Washington, July 18.—To indicate that his government wants peace, President Carrabaja ordered San Luis Potosi surrendered to the constitutionalists. This surrender was made yesterday. Carranza is sending peace commissioners to meet Carrabaja's commission.

Orozco Not to Surrender.

[By Associated Press] El Paso, Texas, July 18.—Villa has received a report that Orozco with his four thousand men, has fled from San Luis Potosi to the mountains, declaring he would never surrender.

Will Protect Foreigners.

**IRISH HOME RULE
MAY BE SETTLED**

[By Associated Press] London, Eng., July 18.—Because of reports that a peaceful settlement is likely soon in the Irish home rule situation, King George today postponed visiting the British fleet so as to be here and use his influence toward the pacifying of Ireland. It is understood the government is offering Ulster the privilege of saying by vote whether or not it will remain out of the Irish Parliament.

**HOPE TO AVOID
RAILROAD STRIKE**

[By Associated Press] Chicago, Ill., July 18.—The unexpected acceptance last night by the unions of federal mediation in the threatened strike on ninety-eight Western railroads by the engineers causes a strong hope today of ultimate peace.

DEAD NEGRO FOUND.
An unknown dead negro was found lying besides the road in the Prospect community late yesterday afternoon, and the body was brought to town this morning. He had gotten medicine in town yesterday and it was thought he was ill. An examination showed that he was shot about the face and head with small shot which was no doubt the cause of his death, but who shot him is not known. The body is being held for identification and the officers believe the case will develop in a day or two.
