GERMANS ARE NOW FAR FROM WARSAW

RETREATED 75 MILES DURING PAST 2 WEEKS

In Haste to Get Away, Abandoned Several of the Most Important Cities of Poland—French Claim Continued Successes in Belgium, Turkey and England Are at War—Japs' Shells Fall in Tsing Tau—Rumored That General Von Kluck Has Been Dead Ten Days—Whereabouts of Defeated British Cruisers Is Unknown—British Guns Had Greater Range Than Germans—President Poincare Claims Victory—England Annexes an Island Belonging to Turkey.

Petrograd, Nov. 5.—The tremendous retreat of the Germans in Russia during the past two weeks is indicated by the fact that the Germans' present positions are seventy-five miles west of their former front about Warsaw.

Paris, Nov. 5.—An official announcement says the allies made progress in Belgium east of Nieuport and on the right bank of the Yser against renewed German attacks.
Between La Basse and Argonne a great artillery duel is on.
In the center the Germans continue the big gun fight.
Some of the German attacks in Belgium were not repulsed until after an all-day fight.

Turkey and England at War.

London, Nov. 5.—State of war between Turkey and Great Britain was officially announced today.

German Cruisers Leave Chile.

London, Nov. 5.—The German cruisers Scharnhorst, Gneisenau and Nuremberg left Valparaiso, Chile, yesterday.

English Guns Were Larger.

London, Nov. 5.—The German version of the Chilean naval battle was published today, but no British reports have been received. It is understood Admiral Craddock's flagship, the Goodhope, was bigger and its guns outranged anything the Germans had.

No British Warships Seen.

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 5.—No British warships have arrived so far in any Chilean port and no wreckage was found off the coast.

Fate of British Cruisers a Mystery.

London, Nov. 5.—The fate of the British cruisers off Chile remains a mystery.

The Santiago dispatch indicates the Germans' claim that the two British cruisers were bottled up was an error. Two of the five German cruisers in the fight are not accounted for, except by German claims.

The British battleship Canopus was supposed to be with Craddock's squadron, but the Germans did not mention it.
The Persian pretender to the throne declared for Germany.

Poincare Claims Victory.

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FARMERS READY FOR RICE INSTITUTE

One or Two Good Men Out of Commission, But Prepared for Great Battle.

Football fans in Houston and Galveston are to have an opportunity of seeing a youngster in action who is generally regarded as the premier ground gainer in football circles in Texas, when the A. & M. College eleven meets the warriors from Rice Institute at Houston Monday, the opening day of the carnival. This youngster is Dudley Everett of Dallas, whose gain in the contest with L. S. U. at Dallas last Saturday, when the Aggies defeated the Pelicans by the overwhelming score of 63 to 9, was the feature of the contest.

Time after time Everett circled the Louisiana ends for long gains, dodging the purple and gold jerseyed men, shaking off tacklers and advancing the ball from six to forty-five yards. While good interference played no small part in these gains nevertheless Everett proved himself perhaps the greatest ground gainer in Texas this season. Playing with Tyree Bell, seasoned football warrior and captain of the Aggies, and with Lee Coleman, Everett has interference that cannot be broken up hardly, but the Dallas boy's determination and speed make it possible for him to advance the ball.

The game will start Monday with Settegast of Houston out of the lineup. The big Houston product has made good on the gridiron and in the contests with T. C. U., Haskell Indians and other early season games, made a great showing at tackle. He did not take part in last week's slaughter of the innocents at Dallas because the freshman rule barred him. He would have started in Monday's contest, however, but for deficiency in class work.

One or two of the second string men have been ruled off the squad on account of deficiencies in class work also, but in the main the men are going good in studies just the same as in football.

A. & M. OFFICIALS TO WASHINGTON

Will Attend Conference of the Heads of Land Grant Colleges in the United States.

Representatives of various departments of the A. & M. College will leave Friday for Washington, where they will attend conferences for heads of land grant colleges in the United States. Among those who will attend from here are Dr. W. B. Bitzell, president; Clarence Gussley, director of extension service; B. Youngblood, director of experiment stations; Dr. G. S. Fraps, State chemist; D. W. Spence, dean of the school of engineering; Dr. W. F. Proctor, State agent in co-operative demonstration work, conducted jointly by the A. & M. College and the United States Department of Agriculture, and R. L. Bennett of Paris, representing the experiment station.

These meetings begin November 19 and continue through the 14th. The various conventions which will be in session during that time are: Conference for presidents of land grant colleges; directors of experiment stations; directors of extension service, this being their first meeting; State chemists; engineers of land grant colleges, and State agents in charge of co-operative demonstration work.

Reports will be made at these meetings and those attending will have the benefit of an exchange of ideas as to how to best conduct their various activities.
