DECLARES RUSSIAN ARMY IS COMPLETELY BEATEN

Assures His People Throughout the German Empire That "Our Beloved East Prussia Is Free From the Enemy"—German Submarine Blockade Is On—Passenger Traffic Suspended, Freight Continues—A Large Type Zepelin Was Lost in Danish Territory—Swift Destroyers Will Protect Threatened Steamers—German Cruiser Sank Four English Ships Off Brazil—The German Note Concedes Nothing to the United States—Russian Prisoners Number 64,000—Austrians Capture Town in Galicia.

Berlin, Feb. 18.—Emperor William is on the Eastern battle line and sent this message: "The Russians are completely beaten. Our beloved East Prussia is free from the enemy."

BLOCKADE IN EFFECT.
(By Associated Press.)
London, Feb. 18.—The first effect of the German blockade was the stoppage of all passenger traffic between England and Holland. The freight service continues.

Largest Type Zepelin Exploded.
(By Associated Press.)
London, Feb. 18.—Last night's reported explosion of a Zepelin in Danish territory has been confirmed. It was the L-3, one of the largest in commission, and was over five hundred feet long. It caught fire in the air and descended hastily. The crew of eighteen all escaped before the explosion. Her speed was forty knots an hour.

Turkey Apologizes to Greece.
(By Associated Press.)
London, Feb. 18.—Turkey has yielded to Greece in her demand for satisfaction for an insult to an attaché at the Greek Embassy in Constantinople. The chief of police in person apologized. The Greek Ambassador had left on account of the insult.

Destroyers Will Protect.
(By Associated Press.)
New York, Feb. 18.—Cable messages today announce that swift British and French destroyers will meet all threatened steamships flying the allies' flags and escort them into

port. Shipping men here say the German blockade will have little effect.

German Cruiser Sank Four Ships.
(By Associated Press.)
Buenos Ayres, Feb. 18.—Since the first of this year the German auxiliary cruiser Crown Prince Wilhelm has destroyed two British steamers and two British ships off the Brazilian coast. The German steamer Holger brought their crews here today.

Turks Celebrate Imaginary Victory.
(By Associated Press.)
Alexandria, Egypt, Feb. 18.—Refugees aboard the American cruiser Tennessee, from Syria, say the Turks have maltreated some foreigners, but generally they are calm. In letters of gold the news of a great alleged Turkish victory was posted in Jaffa, stating the Turks sank several British cruisers, captured the Suez Canal and are now marching on Alexandria. Foreigners in Jerusalem were compelled to remain indoors for safety during the celebration of this "victory."

Germany Concedes Nothing to U. S.
(By Associated Press.)
Berlin, Feb. 18.—The American Ambassador has issued a summary of the German reply to the American note. The German reply is friendly, but refuses to concede to the United States anything. It offers again to withdraw the war zone blockade if England will permit the importation of food to Germany. The note places the entire blame on England, repeating the German arguments already published for the past three days.

The note suggested that the United States has the power to make the declaration of London respected by the allies' fleets and thereby remove the necessity of the blockade. It offers to arrange for American warships to convoy American merchantmen in the war zone carrying non-contraband only.

Russian Prisoners Reach 64,000.

Berlin, Feb. 18.—(Official.)—The Russian prisoners captured in East Prussia now total at least 64,000.

Austrians Capture Kolemia.

Vienna, Feb. 18.—(Official.)—The Austrians have captured Kolemia in Galicia with 2,000 prisoners.
