GERMAN SUBMARINE WAS DESTROYED

MEMBERS OF SUBMARINE CREW TAKEN AND SAVED

Was Rammed by British Destroyer Ariel, and Was One of Largest in German Navy—Members of the Crew Surrendered and Will be Tried for Sinking Merchant Vessels Thought to Have Sunk a British Steamer Tuesday—German Armored Liner Landed at Newport News, Va.—She Carried Many Passengers and Crews of Ships Sunk—Russians Are Crowding Turks and Kurds—Several Italian Warships Put to Sea—Dardanelles Bombardment Was Resumed—A British Aviator Was Killed.

London, March 10.—The British Admiralty announced that the German submarine U-20, one of the largest and newest, has been sunk. The British destroyer Ariel rammed and sunk the submarine. Members of the submarine's crew surrendered and were saved.

This submarine was built in 1913 and had a displacement of 840 tons. Her speed at the surface was seventeen knots, and submerged her speed was twelve knot. She had three torpedo tubes.

The location of the sinking was not announced. The captured crew are deprived of all special privileges and will be held for trial in connection with the sinking of merchant vessels.

This is probably the submarine which yesterday sank the British steamer Blackwood. This makes the seventh German submarine sunk since the beginning of the war, the Admiralty announced.

GERMAN FIGHTER HERE.

Newport News, Va., March 10.—The German armored liner Prinz Eitel Friederich arrived here today.

One side of the cruiser was painted black and the other white. Naval men expressed wonder that the German was able to elude her enemies, saying the feat was greater than the Emden's. She carries women and children among more than three hundred passengers and crews taken from the prizes she sank. The warship is here to make repairs if the United States government will permit. She carried six and four-inch guns, and some reports say she also has eight-inch guns. She came into the harbor with her band playing. An unconfirmed rumor says a British cruiser chased her off this port.

This leaves only three German warships at large and unaccounted for. The Prinz Eitel Friederich brought here the captain, wife and crew of the American sailing vessel William P. Frye, which the Germans sank in the South Atlantic in the middle of January, suspecting she carried contraband. The William P. Frye left

Seattle last November for England.

Russians Crowd Turks and Kurds.

Tiflis, March 10.—The Turks and Kurds which concentrated in Northwestern Persia recently are being forced southward by the Russians. The Russians captured several villages.

It is reported the American consulate in Urumiah in Persian Armenia protected many Armenians from massacre when the Turks occupied that city. Two thousand Armenians were reported locked in one large church, where many died from starvation.

Italian Warships Put to Sea.

ITALY ON EVE OF FINAL DECISION

Council of Ministers in Session and Premier and Foreign Minister Conferred.

[By Associated Press.]

Rome, March 10.—Premier Salandra, after his visit Sunday to Gaeta to inaugurate a new military harbor, a journey during which much National feeling was manifested, had a long interview Monday with Foreign Minister Sonnino. Monday night the Council of Ministers was in session. These facts, together with other indications, lead to the widespread belief that Italy today is upon the eve of great and decisive events.

One of the Premier's remarks at Gaeta is attracting considerable attention. He said: "Our soldiers will be the first to be sacrificed and Italians will see the destiny of their country accomplished."

A bill which would authorize the State railroads to purchase or charter steamers for the transportation of coal and other commodities of first necessity was presented in Parliament Monday by the government. The measure is designed to counteract the effect of steadily increasing ocean freight rates.

ASKS BIG RANSOM TO FREE CATHOLICS

Los Angeles Representative Received Message Saying Ransom Was Church Tax.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 10.—Answering an inquiry as to the present status of the Catholic priests held for ransom in Mexico City, General Alvarado Obregon, commanding the Carranza forces at the Mexican capital, telegraphed to Adolfo Carrillo, Constitutionalist representative here, Tuesday, that 250 Catholic clergymen were held and that they would be kept prisoners until they had paid him \$500,000.

"This is a church tax," Obregon's message reads. "It is due to the Constitutional government, and must be paid. We need the money for food to relieve the suffering of the Mexican people here."

Obregon also telegraphed that foreigners in the Mexican capital were well protected and that he would continue to "care for them."
