### SPECIAL AMBASSADOR FAILED IN THE EFFORT

Being Unable to Reconcile Differences of the Two Nations, the Peace Ambassador Resigned the Job—The Worst Is Now Expected at Any Time—A Condition of Nervousness Exists Among All the Balkan States and They May All Join the Allies—Conditions at Constantinople Look Like Bulgaria Was Planning an Attack on That City—Mine Sweepers Are Clearing the Dardanelles for the Allied Fleet. Turks and Kurds Commit Further Ontrages at the American Mission in Persia—Given Out That Mines Are Blocking Passage of Dardanelles—Germans Torpedoed Another Steamer.

Rome, March 26.—All efforts of the German Ambassador to bring about an agreement between Italy and Austria have finally failed, says a local newspaper. The Ambassador resigned the role as mediator, it is reported.

BALKAN STATES NERVOUS. London, March 26.—An Athens dispatch reports that Field Marshal von der Goltz, representing the German military interests in Turkey, has left Constantinople for Sofia, Bulgaria, and General von Sanders has gone to Adrianople. This indicates that sudden developments in the Balkans is causing Turkey anxiety.

The Bulgarians are recently reported as making military preparations as if for an attack on Constantinople.

Mines Blocked Forcing of Dardanelles. London, March 26.—British naval officers report they believe but for floating mines in the Dardanelles narrow on March 15, the allied fleet would have forced the straits on that day. It is reported these officers assert the forts themselves will be unable to prevent the passage of the straits. The French battleship Galois and British battle cruiser Inflexible, damaged in that fight, are making repairs in sheltered bays. It is reported the Constantinople authorities are forcing all Christians up to the age of 45 to work on the defenses protecting Constantinople.

### WILL DO AWAY WITH THE HOME

Former Attorney General Wickersham Says Such Will Be Effect of Woman Suffrage.

New York, March 26.—George W. Wickersham, formerly Attorney General of the United States, addressing a meeting of anti-suffragists here yesterday, said that if women serve on juries or in the militia or assume the other manifold obligations of citizenship, "the home will be broken up, for there will be no one to care for the children."

"It becomes a question," he said, "whether the home shall make way for the institution, whether the chivalry, the recognition of the higher qualities of woman shall be thrown aside in favor of a larger community in which men and women shall compete in a scramble for positions one above the other."

"Every woman has the ear of at least one man," he said, "and if she is opposed to suffrage it is her duty to convince him and make him go forth to the polls. As a general thing, men will do just what women ask them to."

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### U. S. SUBMARINE GOES TO BOTTOM

Sank Near Honolulu and Crew of Eighteen Perished With the Vessel.

Honolulu, March 26.—More than twenty-four hours after she disappeared in the harbor here, the United States submarine F-4 still had failed to reappear. Many experts believe her crew of eighteen are all dead.

A Texas boy, Walter F. Covington, machinist mate, was among the crew of the sunken submarine F-4 here. He was from Fort Worth. His father resides at Beyers.

The submarine had the latest improved air locks to enable her men to escape and rise to the surface in as much as thirty fathoms. The fact that none appeared leads to the belief that she lies much deeper.

Two tugs got lines fast at thirty-five fathoms in what they believe were the metal rings on the outside of the submarine, specially provided for such raising operations. They are now investigating.

The bottom where she sank is believed to be mountainous and it is feared she is pinioned on a crag. Much fuel oil is on the surface, which may have been discharged by the submarine in an effort to rise.

### WOULD INCREASE RATES ON TRUCK

Railroads Fighting to Increase Rates on Melons, Strawberries, Peaches, Etc.

[By Associated Press.] Chicago, Ill., March 26.—Texas railroads make more profit in transporting gas pipe than on watermelons or cabbage, J. S. Hershey of Galveston, of the Santa Fe System, today told the Western freight rate hearing. The roads want an increase including 10c on strawberries, 8c on peaches, 5c on cabbage and watermelons. These and other truck garden produce increases, Mr. Hershey said, would give the Texas roads an increase of \$135,000 annually in freights.
