ONCE BRYAN WOMAN KILLED HUSBAND

Kate Matesky Confessed to Murder of Second Husband—Was Well Known Here.

Marlin, Tex., March 29.—Mrs. Kate Wilkenowski confessed today that she killed her husband, Edward, at their home here on the night of February 15, last, covered his body with straw, poured oil over it and burned it, burying the bones in post holes.

The police this morning found what they believe to be human bones in the holes she indicated.

She was taken to Waco for safe-keeping.

Kate Matesky, with her first husband, John Matesky, lived in Bryan for a number of years and she con-

tinued to live here for some time after his death. She cooked in a number of Bryan homes and was well known. She still owns her home here on the block east of St. Joseph's Catholic Church. Since her second marriage she has been living at Marlin. She was in Bryan last in January this year to pay her taxes and look after other business matters.

Pete Matesky, a son by her first husband, has been living in a tent at Royall's lake at Union Hill for some time. He was arrested Saturday night and taken to Marlin on the morning train. Officers searched his premises at Union Hill yesterday, but it is not known if anything incriminating was found.

She also had a daughter by her first marriage and she, too, is under arrest with the mother and son.
