DR. JOHN F. EAVES DEAD.

Former Bryan Physician Passed Away in Mexico.

As briefly mentioned in the columns of The Eagle yesterday afternoon, word has been received here by relatives of the death of Dr. John F. Eaves in Mexico. The first information was very meager, the date of his death, neither the place in Mexico being given. A second message has been received, but it contained little further details, except to state his death was only a few days ago and that he was buried with Masonic honors at Frontera, Mexico. His widow added that as soon as she could settle up and arrange their business matters there, she would sail for Texas and join her son at Galveston.

Dr. Eaves was born and reared in this city, was 54 years of age, and a son of the late Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Eaves. His father was a pioneer Baptist preacher in Texas and he and his wife were charter members of the First Baptist Church of Bryan, and Rev. Eaves was at one time its pastor.

Dr. Eaves was a member of the Baptist Church and was a Master Mason. He was a good man, a good citizen and enjoyed the confidence and highest esteem of all who knew him.

His skill and ability as a physician were given due recognition by the medical profession, and during the administration of Dr. George R. Tabor as State Health Officer, Dr. Eaves held an important position under him. It was during this time the last terrible yellow fever epidemic broke out in New Orleans, and Dr. Eaves stood shoulder to shoulder with his chief in the brilliant and splendid fight which kept it out of Texas. Later, while still connected with the State Health Department, he was in charge of the State quarantine station at Galveston and the service rendered was of the highest order. Later he entered the United States hospital service and was assigned to Mexico and had been there for the past several years.

He is survived by his widow, one son, Belo Eaves, and one daughter, Miss Gertrude Eaves. He is also survived by four brothers and three sisters, viz.: S. L. Eaves and A. H. Eaves, Bryan; Dr. W. G. Eaves, Bremond; Mrs. J. A. D. Robinson, Wixon; Mrs. John L. Roberson, Benchley; J. T. Eaves, Austin, and Mrs. Annie Miller, Hood County.
