HAD JUST FILLED BIG BRITISH UNIFORM ORDER

The Factory Had Recently Filled an Order for British Government of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Uniforms—A Bomb Was Used to Wreck the Building—Big Lot of Dynamite With Burned Out Fuse Was Found Under Armory Where Two Hundred Soldiers Had Slept—London Concedes Losses on Gallipoli and Says Turks Have Taken the Offensive—Bad Weather Interfers on the Austro-Italian Front—Kaiser Directing Army Near Lemberg and Russians Are Being Pressed Further Back—French Claim Gains on the Western Front.

Windsor, Ont., June 21.—An overall factory of the Peabody Company, limited, which had just made one hundred and fifteen thousand uniforms for the British army was partly wrecked by a bomb today. The loss was about ten thousand dollars.

Twenty-seven sticks of dynamite with a time fuse burned out were found under an armory here, where two hundred soldiers had slept last night.

LONDON ACKNOWLEDGES LOSS.

London, June 21.—The Turks yesterday took the offensive in the Gallipoli Peninsula, according to a Constantinople report, and inflicted heavy losses on the Anglo-French. Turkish artillery compelled them to change their positions.

German Report.

Berlin, June 21.—(Official)—The Kaiser was present at the battle for the possession of Grodek, near Lemberg. The Russians are still west of Lemberg.

The Austro-Germans have captured Rawa Ruska within thirty miles of Lemberg.

French Statement.

Paris, June 21.—Further successes north of Arras and Vosges are officially announced today. In Lorraine the French announced the capture of a German position nearly a mile long. The fighting is unusually violent.

O'LEARY ACQUITTED AT MARSHALL

No Testimony Introduced and Court Ordered Verdict of Acquittal.

Marshall, Texas, June 21.—The State moved to dismiss the charges against Frank O'Leary, on the ground that there was not sufficient evidence to convict. The defense contended that O'Leary had a right to be acquitted by the jury to prevent possible slurs on his reputation. The trial was ordered to continue.

No evidence was introduced, and in the court's instructions, the jury returned a formal verdict of not guilty. Trials of the others connected with the case have not been set.

PRINCIPAL RESIGNS AT PRAIRIE VIEW

Professor E. L. Blackshear Quits Post Few Days Succeeding His Re-Election.

To the Eagle.

College Station, Tex., June 21.—Inclosed you will find, under date of June 12, 1915, a copy of letter of resignation of Professor E. L. Blackshear of Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College. Mr. Blackshear had only a few days previous to this date been elected by the board of directors to continue as president of Prairie View, and I know of no other reason for his resignation other than from patriotic motives, and for what he conceives to be the best interest of the college so dear to his heart, and to which he has given many of the best years of his life.

The resignation upon the part of Mr. Blackshear was entirely voluntary. I have furnished you a copy of this letter merely as a news item. You may publish or not, as you see proper. Yours respectfully,

FRANK'S SENTENCE WAS COMMUTED

Governor of Georgia Changed Death Penalty To Life in the Penitentiary.

Atlanta, Ga., June 21.—Gov. Slaton today commuted Frank's death sentence to life imprisonment. The announcement was made after Frank was secretly taken from jail to the State prison farm at Millidgeville.

"All I ask is that the people of Georgia read the statement and reasons why I commuted Frank. I would feel like a murderer if I let him hang. It may mean obscurity the rest of my days, but I had rather plow in the field the rest of my life than to have his blood on my hands," said Gov. Slaton in announcing the commutation.

Gov. Slaton issued a long statement reviewing the case, saying he was in doubt as to Frank's guilt, pointing out the alleged inconsistencies in the state's case. Crowds gathered in the streets and criticized Gov. Slaton. Extra police were on duty and closed all near-by saloons. There was one arrest. Frank was to hang tomorrow.

DIED SUDDENLY.

Jonas Blake, an old negro of this city, died at his home in Freedman about 5:30 o'clock, Saturday afternoon from a severe attack of heart disease. Blake joined in the festivities of the Emancipation Day celebration heartily, but went to his home about 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon saying he felt bad. Shortly after reaching home he was stricken as stated above and died in a short time.

There have been no Yaqui attacks on foreigners recently. Carranzistas are advancing from Simola against the Villistas.

GRAND-FATHER LAW WAS KNOCKED OUT

United States Supreme Court Makes Several Important Rulings.

Washington, June 21.—The Supreme Court annuls the Oklahoma grandfather clause, restricting the negro vote on the grounds it is unconstitutional. The court also annulled the grandfather clause in the Annapolis, Maryland, city law.

The court ruled against the government in the government's suit to forfeit the unsold portion of the Oregon, California railroad land, valued at more than thirty million.

The court decided to review the decision of the customs court, which held that five per cent discount on imports in American ships extends also to goods imported in ships of a favored nation from treaty countries.
