## LEAVE RUSSIAN PROVINCE OF GRODNO FOR INTERIOR

Leaving the Country Ahead of Devastating Armies—Go On Foot to Railroad and by Train to Interior Cities—A Liner With 1,600 Italian Reservists On Board Was Reported On Fire at Sea—Another Zeppelin Raid Was Made On England Last Night—The Austro-German Forces Are Making Hard Drives, but Meeting Strong Resistance—Turks Claim Advantages On Galipoli—A Naval Engagement Was Reported in Which an Austrian Torpedo Boat Was Badly Damaged.

London, Sept. 13.—There is a wholesale exodus of the people from the townships and villages in the Russian Province of Grodno, say today's dispatches. The people flee afoot to railroad points and thence by train to the larger interior cities.

#### ITALIAN TRANSPORT ON FIRE.

New York, Sept. 13.—No further word was today received from the liner Santa Anna, reported afire yesterday with 1,600 Italian reservists on board 1,000 miles off Halifax.

#### ANOTHER ZEPPELIN RAID.

London, Sept. 13.—Another Zeppelin raid over the east coast of England last night was reported today. No damage was done and there were no casualties, it is said.

The Austro-German armies, striving for definite results, still progress everywhere save on the Galician front, where the Russians report further success.

In the North, where the Russian line was straightened by the retreat of the center, von Hindenburg is driving violently toward Dvinsk and the Dvina river.

In the center Crown Prince Leopold has crossed the Zelwanka and is attacking in the vicinity of Skidel.

In the South von Mackensen is pressing toward Hinsk on both sides of the railroad.

The final objective of the central powers in this campaign is still an unsolved problem.

The other fronts are comparatively quiet.

#### Waiting for Archibald.

Washington, Sept. 12.—Agents of the Department of Justice, acting under directions from the White House, will meet on his return James P. J. Archibald, American newspaper correspondent who acted as message bearer for Ambassador Dumba in the incidents which led to the United States' request for the withdrawal of the Austrian ambassador. Archibald will be met at the dock when he leaves the steamer Rotterdam. Federal authorities are studying to see if a Federal statute has been violated.

#### Turks Claim Advantage

Constantinople, Sept. 13.—Turkish artillery destroyed the enemy's artillery equipment in the Anafarta section yesterday and at Seddul-Bahr. Three hostile warships fired effectively at various Turkish positions, says today's official statement.

#### No Agreement on Arabic.

Washington, Sept. 13.—Secretary Lansing today announced that no decision has been reached on Germany's request to arbitrate the issues of the case growing out of the sinking of the steamer Arabic and the loss of American lives.

#### Naval Engagement Reported.

Rome, Sept. 13.—The Minister of Marine today declared that in a naval battle last Thursday between Austrian and Italian vessels, an Austrian torpedo boat was badly damaged. A French submarine participated.

Attack Occurred Soon After Dawn and Two Soldiers Were Wounded.



Brownsville, Tex., Sept. 13.—Mexicans early today attacked a patrol of United States cavalry two miles up the Rio Grande from here and wounded two soldiers. The fight took place soon after dawn.

One Trooper Killed.

Brownsville, Tex., Sept. 13.—A later report of the attack says the Mexicans early today attacked a United States patrol of seven troopers at Los Indios irrigation station, killing one and wounding two others, one of whom is probably fatally wounded. Great excitement prevails as this is the first outbreak in the border troubles in several days.

## TREMENDOUS ARSON TRUST IS ALLEGED

St. Louis Police Believe Nine Men Are in Combine—Some of Them Capitalists.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 13.—What detectives termed the "biggest arson trust ever operated in any city," was disclosed here Saturday night, and, according to the detectives, a "multitude of men, several of them capitalists," are involved. The disclosures were made by one of the four men arrested Saturday while they were delivering four barrels of gasoline to a factory which they had agreed to burn.

The four men arrested while conveying the gasoline, Chief of Detectives Allender said, are the "torches" or active incendiaries of the arson trust. As a result of their confession the police also arrested Herbert O. Baker, an insurance agent connected with a prominent concern.

Late last night the police charged that Baker had "promoted" two large fires. According to Detective Keaney, who has been investigating arson plots here for six years, the arson syndicate which was turned up is composed of nine men. Baker and the four "torches," Keaney said. The other four are men prominent in the insurance world, in civic, social and political affairs. The men "higher up" are known by the police and their arrest is expected momentarily.

## SURPRISE SPRUNG IN ELECTION CASES

Testimony Shows Bribery in Primary and Indictment Alleges General Election.

Corpus Christi, Tex., Sept. 13.—Matt Dunn, a government witness in the election frauds prosecution, today sprang a surprise when he testified that he held a conversation with his cousin, Tom Dunn, a defendant, about buying votes, related to the July primary and not to the general election in 1914. The government was disappointed as the indictment is based on the November election, in which three Congressmen were chosen.

## MILLIONAIRE SCHWAB IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Aged Financier Was Badly Broken Up, But It is Said He Will Recover.
