A. & M. EXTENSION TO BE ENLARGED

Director Clarence Ousley Perfecting Great Plans for Coming Year's Work.

College Station, Tex., Sept. 11.—"Maximum service at minimum cost to the Federal and State governments," is the watchword of the extension service of the A. & M. College, which entered upon a new year September 1.

An ambitious program of service to the agricultural interests of the State, made possible by increased appropriations from the State government to match the magnificent allowance from the Federal government by reason of the Smith-Lever act, has been agreed upon by Mr. Ousley and the Washington authorities. Here are the approved projects which will be carried out by specialists: Administration. Printing and distribution of bulletins. Home economics. Movable schools or short courses. Creamery extension work. Dairy extension work. Boys' club work. Rural credits. Work with negroes. Farm demonstration work. Rural organization. Farm engineering.

It was to plan the details of the year's work under these various heads of projects that Mr. Ousley called a meeting last week of all employees of the extension service. A sort of efficiency meeting where the specialists of the service were given full information as to the plans for the coming year, invited to offer suggestions as to how the work may be improved, and to receive fresh enthusiasm for their labor.

At this meeting President Bizzell, Director Youngblood of the experiment station, and representatives of the agricultural departments of railroads were present and addressed the extension workers on methods of making the work effective.

Specialists in the various divisions discussed their work with each other and submitted recommendations to Director Ousley for rendering the work more effective. The organization of the experiment station, the college proper and the extension service was explained by Director Youngblood, President Bizzell and Director Ousley and the heads of the various college departments in what ways their departments could reach the people of Texas through the extension service.

To carry on the work as it has been planned the employment of a number of new specialists has been made necessary. The home economics department now has four women leaders who will devote all of their time to work in domestic science and club work with women and girls. Miss Bernice Carter, assistant State agent in charge of girls' club work; Miss Cornelia Simpson, demonstrator in domestic science for girls; Mrs. Nat P. Jackson, in charge of organization and reading courses for farm women; Mrs. G. M. Garren, until recently in charge of domestic science for the State Department of Agriculture in North Carolina, will conduct demonstration work for the farm women. In addition to these four women leaders specialists in dairying, poultry, home gardening and other such fields will be available for addresses and demonstrations before women's meetings. In fact, much of the time of one dairy lecturer and of the poultry expert will be given to this feature of the work.

Movable schools or short courses will be conducted all through the coming year rather than through the summer months alone, as has been the practice heretofore. A team of experts will be kept in the field the year around for this work and will be available for short courses at small towns and country communities. C. M. Evans, animal husbandman, will be in charge of this team. He will have the assistance of F. W. Karmel, poultry expert; G. M. Garren, agronomist; R. L. Pon, dairy specialist; W. B. Lanham, horticulturist; J. C. Olsen, agricultural engineering, and others. For creamery organization and work along that line, J. L. Thomas of the United States Department of Agriculture will be stationed at College Station. Sanitary milk production campaigns also will be conducted by him.

Special efforts to increase the enrollment and interest in boys' club work will be made during the next year. H. H. Williamson, State agent in charge of this work, will be assisted by C. C. French, until recently of Fort Worth, who has had much experience, representing the stock yards interests in pig and baby beef clubs. The enrollment now is more than 8,000.

In rural credits, R. L. Bennett of Paris will continue his campaign in developing safe systems of farming as a basis for bank credits. His work has been considered so effective that the United States Department of Agriculture has endorsed his rate sheet and recommended the adoption of his credit plan throughout the Southern States.

Farm demonstration work will be continued with redoubled energy. W. P. Proctor, State agent, and his six district agents have placed many new agents in Texas counties during the last fiscal year. Work with the negroes of Texas will begin for the first time. R. L. Smith, a negro educator, has been selected to lead a team of two negroes, one man and one woman, in

awakening the negroes to a full realization of their opportunities in agriculture. As fast as a consistent organization can be developed more workers will be added. At present the negro leaders will devote the greater part of their energies to acquainting the negroes with their opportunities. The enrollment of negroes as demonstrators under the county demonstration agents is one important feature.

Some of the most effective organization work in the State was done during the last year by the extension service in organizing diversification societies. This work will be continued with S. B. Holman, H. L. McKnight and Dr. R. M. Harkey as leaders. In the past year hundreds of acres of hilly lands in Texas have been reclaimed as a result of the terracing done by J. C. Olsen of the college agricultural engineering department. Mr. Olsen will be continued both as a demonstrator in farm terracing and in doing the work where it is most needed.

Educational campaigns in methods of safeguarding swine from hog cholera, in measures of control and eradication, will be carried on by Dr. Frank R. Jones, government specialist in that line of work. That is another important feature of the extension as planned by Mr. Ousley.

To carry on these important projects a Federal fund of \$45,969.67 and a State fund of \$35,969.67 is set aside. To spend these funds wisely will demand the attention of the wisest of men. "Not one cent of these funds given into the trusteeship of the A. & M. extension service will be expended foolishly. I had rather turn it back into the treasury than to expend it on projects which are meaningless and which make for no real service," said Mr. Ousley in speaking of the year's work. "We are planning to make our work this season more practical than heretofore. When clubs are organized it shall be our purpose to keep them active and interested by giving them to do work which will make better farmers and stockmen of them. Every short course, every lecture will be followed up by campaigns to bring about the very things urged by our speakers.

"The women are to receive much attention and our four women leaders with the aid of the thirty-eight county agents under the joint direction of the college and the Federal government, will work unceasingly to bring about a better day for the women on the farm.

"We want to reach the men whom we have not reached as yet. The man who reads the bulletins and studies constantly is not the man we need to meet and instruct, but rather the man who disregards what once was called 'book farming,' now admitted the best farming in the land. "The extension service simply is the legs of the college and the experiment station. We receive fresh truths from these two agencies and disseminate them to those who can not come in direct touch with the college and experiment station."

SOME POSTSCRIPTS.

To detect gas in mines there has been invented apparatus wherein a rat operates a treadmill to furnish power for a small incandescent lamp, the dimming of the light indicating that the rat is affected by the gas.

For blowing whistles or ringing bells at set times there has been invented an electrical device that makes contacts by use of a punched paper ribbon, easily replaced when a schedule is to be changed.

To prevent waste of current a new electric light switch for seldom used places is combined with a buzzer that sounds while lights are burning, reminding their user to turn them off when through with them.

New French automobile wheels are equipped with both pneumatic and solid tires, the latter being slightly smaller and arranged to share the burden when heavy loads depress the former or they are punctured.

Ultra-violet light rays are blamed for the fading of specimens in European museums and a search is being made for a glass for cases that will cut off the rays and at the same time be colorless and inexpensive.

In granting concessions for development of its recently discovered potash deposits Spain is requiring concessionaires to reserve for National consumption such parts of the salts as the government deems advisable.

The net weight of any commodity stored in a container is given automatically by the aid of a new scale attachment that balances an empty container against the one in use and causes the weight of the latter to be left out of the scale reading.

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
