WOMEN STRIVE FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

German Women Use Advantages in Absence of Men Heretofore Denied Them.

Berlin, Oct. 5.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Women have taken advantage as never before of the absence of men from the various German universities to strive for the higher education that not so many years ago was denied them.

The actual increase in point of numbers is not as great in two earlier years, when the figures jumped by 680 and 478, respectively.

The number of women studying medicine shows the largest increase, rising from 974 to 1,150. Five years ago there were but 512.

The Southern German universities have suffered losses and the Prussian universities have gained in number of women students. The attendance includes 1,923 at Berlin, 492 at Bonn, 388 at Munich, 277 at Merburg, 252 at Heidelberg, 242 at Goettingen, 240 at Munster, 230 at Leipzig, 225 at Breslau, 171 at the new University of Frankfurt, 151 at Freiburg, 150 at Koenigsberg, 137 at Jena, 122 at Halle, 98 at Kiel, 78 at Greifswald, 60 at Tubingen, 56 at Strassburg, 49 at

REMARKABLE FEAT IN SURGERY

Chamber of the Heart Opened and a Bullet Removed by German Physicians.

Berlin, Oct. 5.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The opening of a chamber of the heart and extracting a bullet is reported by Prof. Freund and Dr. Casperion in the current number of the Munich Medical Weekly.

To prevent possible dangerous complications it was determined to remove the bullet. The breast was opened, the pericardium slit sufficiently to permit the heart to be brought forward.

The bullet, which weighed twelve grams, had taken a most erratic and extraordinary course. It struck the soldier on the left shoulder from above, as he was storming forward, inflicting but a flesh wound.
