Weather Conditions.

The area of high barometric pressure that was central over the plains States on Tuesday morning has moved eastward to the central valleys and gave colder weather in all sections east of the Mississippi river. Shallow barometric depressions are noted over the Canadian Northwest and over California, and temperatures have been rising in the Plateau, Rocky Mountain region and plains States. More or less cloudy weather was reported from the Northwest and West, and light to moderate rains occurred in Oregon and Washington. Clear skies were reported from the western cotton belt and from all sections east of the Mississippi river. A light rain occurred last night at Palestine, which was the only precipitation reported from any section east of the Pacific slope.

## HARD PRACTICE FOR FARMERS

Seriousness From Indian Game Eliminated and Eleven Has Begun Steady Grind for Rice.

College Station, Tex., Nov. 4.—Practice yesterday afternoon was rather light owing to the fact that most of the men were very sore from the Indian game last Saturday, but Coaches Harlan and Graves started the steady grind that will probably continue the remainder of the season. The game with Rice Institute next Monday will be the last contest before the Farmers meet the Longhorns on Kyle field at College Station on November 19. For that reason the Farmers will do their best in Houston Monday. Many new plays will be tried out to test their value against the Longhorns.

Then, too, the Farmers will have far from a walkover when they oppose the Owls. The comparative scores of the T. C. U. A. & M. game at Fort Worth in which A. & M. only defeated the Christians 13 to 10, and the T. C. U. Rice game in Houston last Friday, when Rice piled up an easy score of 33 to 3, the comparison of these scores makes even the most cocksure A. & M. booster sit up and think. The Farmers, of course, have improved very much since the T. C. U. game, but the Christians should have grown stronger, too, in the meantime, and the fact that Rice made a net score over four times as large as A. & M. is a very sore point among Farmer boosters. "We are not offering any alibis or

excuses in advance of the game," says Head Coach Harlan. "Our men shall all be in pretty good shape by Monday. We believe, however, that Rice has a strong team this year, but what it takes to beat them we have." A lot of work is being done on the Farmers' line and it should be able to put up a good defense in Monday's game. The Aggies showed up at a disadvantage in the Indian game when the Redskins backed the Hon. Coaches Harlan and Graves are giving this part of their machine particular attention.
