THE DAY OBSERVED AT A. & M.

Big Turkey Dinner to Thousand Students by Bernard Shisa, Hop Friday Night.
Thanksgiving day was celebrated appropriately at the A. & M. College today. No duties were required of the students and aside from an appropriate Thanksgiving service this morning at the chapel no set program was carried out. This afternoon the football game between Texas A. & M. and the Mississippi A. & M. College was a feature. Tonight the cadets are free to do as they please.
Thanksgiving exercises in the chapel this morning were conducted by cadets. T. K. Morris read and discussed President Wilson's Thanksgiving Proclamation. L. V. Wither read Governor Ferguson's proclamation and gave a brief historical sketch of Thanksgiving celebration. A violin solo by cadet M. Blankfield and a reading by Mrs. C. S. Tatum were other numbers on the program.
Today Bernard Shisa, steward at the A. & M. College for thirty-eight years will gladden the hearts of more than 1,000 cadets with a monator turkey dinner. The dinner is the best in the world says the steward.
Friday the big event of the Thanksgiving season will be given in the Shisa hall when the cadet corps tenders the annual ball to the football team. J. P. Garrity, of the football squad who is said-to be the greatest end in Southwestern football this year is president of the ball and will lead the grand march. This is one of the prettiest social events of the year at A. & M. and attracts fair feminine visitors from all sections of Texas. Approximately 150 couples will participate in this dance.
After the Thanksgiving celebrations

are over the cadets will settle down to consistent work. No term examinations will be held until the latter part of January but students will settle down to hard work in preparation for these examinations.

MRS. LILLIAN C. MONDRICK DEAD.
Died Suddenly and Alone at Her Home Late Wednesday Afternoon.

The citizens of Bryan and community were shocked yesterday afternoon when the news spread that Mrs. Lillian C. Mondrick, wife of Dr. A. L. Mondrick, had died suddenly at her home at 5:30 o'clock. The news cast a gloom over the entire community.
At the time of her death she is reported to have been at home alone, but during the day had not complained of feeling badly and seemed in the best of health. She was found by her husband about 5:45 o'clock lying on a bed, where she had evidently lain down for a little rest, and from appearance had just breathed her last. The deep sympathy of all is extended to the members of the family in this sad hour.

Mrs. Mondrick was formerly Miss Lillian Carr. She was born in this city on December 26, 1873, which made her 41 years, 10 months and 25 days of age. She was reared here and was loved by all who knew her. She was one of Bryan's most talented women, having received an excellent literary and musical education in a convent in Austin, Texas.

She was a splendid Christian lady and had been a member of the Methodist Church for many years, every willing to aid in all charitable enterprises and was an earnest worker in the cause of the Lord.

She is survived by her husband, Dr. A. L. Mondrick, and three children, one daughter, Mrs. A. S. Walker of this city, and two sons, Robert Davis of Hearne and William Davis of this city.

The funeral was held from the family residence this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock and the remains were interred in the City Cemetery. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. T. Tally, pastor of the First Methodist Church.
