FERGUSON PLEASSED WITH EASTERN TRIP

Held Conference With President and With Secretary Garrison on Border Situation.

Austin, Tex., Dec. 21.—Governor Ferguson Monday resumed his official duties as chief executive after having been absent from Texas for three weeks. Lieutenant Governor Hobby, who has been acting governor during the absence of Governor Ferguson, left for his home at Beaumont, accompanied by Mrs. Hobby.

Governor Ferguson visited Chicago, Washington, New York and St. Louis. Governor Ferguson expressed himself as being greatly pleased with the conference he had with President Wilson and Secretary Lansing relative to the Mexican situation and he feels certain that the Mexican situation is now better understood in Washington than heretofore. The governor said that he told the president that General Carranza was fully capable of handling the situation, and that

subsequent events in Mexico have clearly demonstrated that his argument was correct.

"I told the president that it was my opinion that Carranza would have Villa shorn of power within thirty days," said Governor Ferguson. "I was pleased today when I read the dispatches that Villa had quit. Information I gathered at Washington was that this government intended to aid Carranza in every way possible."

With reference to his conference with Secretary of War Garrison on the subject of the federal allotment for the Texas National Guard, the governor said it was very satisfactory and encouraging. The government has contended that the shortage in supplies furnished Texas was approximately \$90,000. During the conference Secretary Garrison practically agreed to reduce the amount to \$58,000. A further reduction is looked for.

Asked what decision he would reach in the movement for calling a special session of the legislature to correct errors in the primary election laws, Governor Ferguson said he had the matter under consideration and expected to soon solve the problem. He did not intimate what action he would take.

GOOD ROADS BONDS WERE APPROVED

County Judge J. T. Maloney and Special Counsel Judge J. W. Doremus, have returned from Austin, where they went on business connected with the county good roads bonds. The \$400,000 worth of bonds were received from the engravers a few days ago and Judge Maloney and Judge Doremus carried them to Austin, where they were approved by the comptroller and registered in the office of the secretary of state. Every thing is now ready for the delivery of the bonds and securing the funds therefor. Judge Maloney believes he will be able to announce tomorrow all details connected with the sale of the bonds and just when the money will be available.
