GIVEN SAME TREATMENT AS OTHER BATTLESHIPS

The New Rule of Regarding Armed Merchant-Men as Other Battleships by Germany, Will go Into Effect at Midnight Tonight. Fighting Continues With Great Violence on French Front. Germans Make no Further Gains and Seem to be Weakening. Italy Has Seized a Number of German Ships Interned in her Ports. A French Auxiliary Cruiser was Sunk. Italian Liners, Armed for Defense Cleared from New York. British Casualties for February Given.

[By Associated Press.] Berlin, Feb. 29.—The Associated Press was informed that Germany's new rule on submarine warfare, regarding the treatment of armed merchantmen, will positively become effective at midnight tonight.

[By Associated Press.] London, Feb. 29.—The bombardment north of Verdun continues with intensity, although the German attack as a whole has less driving power. The pressure has been shifted from point to point. In the meanwhile, the whole French line is delivering a vigorous counter stroke. There were hand to hand encounters near Douaumont last night and the Germans were repulsed, according to the French.

The Germans captured Manhuelles village, but the French drew up to the western boundary town. The Germans occupied a small section of French trenches in Lorraine, but were driven out, the French said. The German war office announces progress in the Woevre drive, capturing five important towns and more than 16,000 French prisoners at Douaumont. Petrograd declares the Turks are evacuating Trebizond and neighboring Black Sea towns.

AMERICAN NOVELIST DIES IN LONDON

[By Associated Press.] London, Feb. 29.—Henry James, the distinguished American novelist, died here last night.

Italy Seizes German Ships.

[By Associated Press.] London, Feb. 29.—It was announced in the house of commons today that Italy had requisitioned thirty-four of thirty-seven German steamers interned in Italian ports.

French Cruiser Sank.

[By Associated Press.] Paris, Feb. 29.—The auxiliary French cruiser Provence was sunk in the Mediterranean Saturday. It was announced officially today. Two hundred and ninety-six survivors were landed at Malta. The ministry of marine estimates the number of survivors at 870.

Armed Liners Leave New York.

[By Associated Press.] Washington, Feb. 29.—The Italian liners Giuseppe Verdi and San Guglielmo, at New York with mounted guns aboard, were ordered cleared today on assurances of the Italian government that their armament was for defensive purposes only.

British February Casualties.

[By Associated Press.] London, Feb. 29.—The British casualties on all areas during February total 739 officers and 17,847 men, according to the published lists.


STEAMER SINKING PASSENGERS SAVED

MINE EXPLOSION WITH FOUR DEAD

Nearly One Hundred Workers Are Entombed and May Not Escape.

[By Associated Press.] Kempton, W. Va., Feb. 29.—Seventy-one miners were entombed in the Davis Coal Company's mine here today by an explosion. Thirty-nine have been recovered, four dead, two probably fatally injured and the balance remained unhurt, except those who are still in the mine. Rescuers are working to rescue the entire crew as fast as possible. Fifty-two have been rescued alive, while nine men are still missing and six are dead.

FERGUSON SAVES ANOTHER NEGRO

Commutes Sentence From Death to Life Term Harris County Negro.

[By Associated Press.] Houston, Tex., Feb. 29.—Governor Ferguson has commuted to life imprisonment the death penalty of Henry Tannel, the negro charged with assault on a negro girl, to life imprisonment, authorities were informed today. Execution was set for Feb. 16, but a thirty-day reprieve was granted, and after looking into the case the governor decided to commute the sentence.

\$25,000 STOLEN FROM MAIL POUCH

BIG WHEAT EXPORTS FROM GALVESTON

February Record Nearly Double of January and Largest Since December, 1914.

[By Associated Press.] Galveston, Tex., Feb. 29.—Exports of grain through Galveston during present month amounted to 4,322,600 bushels. Wheat exports amounted to 4,322,600 and corn and kafir combined up the remainder of the total. Of the wheat exports 794,000 bushels went to Rotterdam for the account of the commission for relief of Belgium. The February exports were nearly double those for January and are the largest since December of 1914.
