GREAT SEA FIGHTERS ARE IN ACTION

HEAVY BOMBARDMENT AT DIFFERENT POINTS

German Battle Cruisers Appeared Near The Hague Today and Were Engaged by British Ships—The Germans Retiring After Twenty Minutes—German Ships Fired a Few Shots at Coast—Hard Fighting Still Goes on About Verdun—More Russian Troops Arrive in France—Warships Bombarded German Positions on Belgian Coast—Zeppelins Made Another Raid on London With Small Damage—Bulgaria's Losses During the War Were Heavy.

London, England, April 25.—German battle cruisers appeared off Loewestoff, almost opposite the Hague, early today and were engaged by local naval forces. The German warships retreated in twenty minutes, but opened fire on the coast before leaving. Two men, one woman and one child were killed. The material damage was apparently small.

London, April 25.—The Germans, after a heavy bombardment, drove home three violent attacks on Dead Man's Hill during the night. Paris claims a complete repulse of the first two and that the third attack, assisted by gas, broke down another contingent.

More Russian troops arrived at Marseilles for use on the western front.

Eight British aeroplanes raided a hostile camp at Quatia, Egypt, near the Suez Canal, and the camp was destroyed.

Germany's positions on the Belgian coast were attacked by warships today. The bombardment was described as one of the heaviest of the war.

London, England, April 25.—Rioting in Dublin in which the postoffice was forcibly taken possession of, telegraphic communications cut, and 12 civilians and five soldiers were killed before the disturbances were quieted, was told of in the House of Commons today by Augustine Bierrrell, chief secretary for Ireland. He declared that the rebels were in possession of four or five different parts of Dublin.

TWO INTERURBANS WILL CO-OPERATE

Bryan-College Line to Take Over Passenger and Express Business on Bottom Road.

The Bryan-College Interurban is working out a plan whereby it proposes to take over the passenger and express business on the Bryan and Central Texas Interurban between Bryan and Whitaker. The change is to be made about May 1 and a double daily service will be inaugurated and connections will be made at Bryan Junction with all trains on the Giddings cut-off passing that place. In speaking of the matter, Mr. Levinson, manager of the Bryan-College Interurban, says:

"We also hope to conclude arrangements with the H. & T. C. Railroad whereby that company will permit the use of their main line in Bryan for a connection with the tracks of the College Interurban to enable us to bring the passengers from the Bottoms in to the heart of the city, entraining and detraining at our present little station."

For this new service Mr. Levinson is having one of the gasoline motor cars of the College road overhauled and put in thorough repair at a cost of several hundred dollars. It is his purpose to make the service first class in every respect and no effort and no expense will be spared in accomplishing this result.

This new service is something Bryan has needed for a long time. It will be a great trade builder and stimulant to our retail business, and The Eagle hopes to see it receive the patronage and co-operation of the entire community.

OBREGON WOULD POLICE ALL NORTHERN MEXICO

This Is Expected to Be the Plan Which He Will Lay Before General Scott at Their Conference—If Scott Deems Plan Sufficient to Handle Villa, Carranza Will Renew Request for Withdrawal.

(By Associated Press.) El Paso, Texas, April 25.—Assurances that the de facto government is able to cope with the Villa bands will likely be made by General Obregon to General Scott at the coming conference. Obregon, it was learned, will describe his plans for policing all Northern Mexico, and should General Scott deem the plan adequate, Carranza will renew his request to have the Americans withdrawn. Consul Garcia is not informed when Obregon will arrive here. As provisions sufficient to last thirty days have been sent the troops, it is evident the troops will not be withdrawn for several weeks yet.

It is expected the Scott-Obregon conference will not occur for a week at least. This is the overshadowing topic in the Mexican situation today.

Obregon Concentrates Troops.

(By Associated Press.) San Antonio, Texas, April 25.—

Added interest was given the Obregon-Scott conference today by receipt of news that more Mexican troops are being concentrated in Northern Mexico. It is realized that Obregon has placed his forces so that by the time he meets General Scott he will have behind him and within easy reach no less than 40,000 men. Failure by Obregon to convince General Scott of the soundness of his diplomatic arguments could be followed by an army of men, it was asserted, by a practical use of this combined force. It was announced at departmental headquarters that General Funston will accompany General Scott to the conference.

General Funston's participation in the border negotiations, was ordered by the war department, believing that the purpose of the conference would be better served if General Scott has with him one who is more intimately acquainted with the details. Three minor engagements between Major Howzer's picked squadron and Carranza troops were recounted in the dispatches from the front to headquarters today.

Obregon on Way.

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GREAT REVIVAL THE CHIEF TOPIC

With Passing Days the Interest Grows and Each Service Sees Great Results.

At 4-o'clock yesterday afternoon a company of men gathered at the place appointed for the prayer meeting over the First National Bank. W. S. Wilson, Jr. was the leader. After reading a few verses from I John, he made a short talk and called for general expressions. The subject was "Love," and men learned that all are very much alike. All appreciate loving encouragement. Quite a number of practical talks were made.

The ladies' societies of the various churches met in their respective places, and much of the spirit and time was in the interest of the meetings.

At the evening service the singing was climaxed by "The Old Time Religion." Dr. Smith read from the second chapter of Hebrews and talked on the "Great Salvation and the Neglect of It, and the Consequences of That Neglect."

Salvation is great in its plan and object of saving a man from the effects of sin, the practice of sin, the habit of sin, and saves to a life of newness and fulness, a life hid with Christ in God.

Again our salvation is great because of what it cost. The Father's heart was torn, the Son's life and blood were given. All the good things of our present good meeting have cost somebody sacrifice and time and patient suffering.

From a legal standpoint the evidence of the four gospels is con-

clusive to the claims of Jesus Christ. But if one will take Him as Lord and Savior and put God to the test He will give him the evidence in his own heart and life. "Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts and let him return unto the Lord and he will have mercy upon him and unto our God and He will abundantly pardon."

This Morning's Service.

Unselfishness was the theme of the hour. The scripture injunction to think not upon our own things but also on the things of others was emphasized. The sacrifice for others, in every day life, in the great work of missions, in the principle of brotherhood represented by our glorious American stars and stripes—these are expressions of the principle of unselfishness. We should not magnify the faults of others. Bible characters were not perfect. The divine record told the whole truth about them. We are not any better. It is not what others have done for us but what we have done for others that will make us the happiest in the hour of death.
