On motion the delegates were instructed to vote for Governor Ferguson for delegate at large from Texas to the national democratic convention at St. Louis; for Hon. C. H. Mills of Corsicana for delegate at large, and for Hon. J. W. Doremus for presidential elector. The delegates were also instructed to vote as a unit on all questions.

The convention on motion was then adjourned.

UNITED CHRISTIAN WORKERS.

Important Meeting of Executive Board Monday Afternoon.

A meeting of the executive board of the United Christian Workers was held at the Christian Church on Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock, and each member present showed a marked degree of enthusiasm in the different phases of work which have been undertaken since the organization, and earnestness of purpose and the performance of the smallest duty by each member was emphasized by one of the representatives as being that which would ultimately lead them to success.

The treasurer was instructed to call a meeting of all the treasurers of the various societies and definitely carry out the plan, which had been voted to adopt, as a means of securing funds, viz: That the membership of each society would be assessed, according to the number of members enrolled, so each would bear equally the expense incurred by the organization.

The report of the program committee, with Mrs. W. B. Cline as chairman, which had been appointed to arrange a program for an open meeting on June 26, was very favorable and the features of the program which were discussed have every indication of being profitable to those who attend. The purpose of the open meeting is educational, inasmuch as the organization must make known its real aim to the public, and in no better way could it enlist its sympathy and co-operation than by this method, which the committee has seen fit to pursue. The program for this meeting will be published at a later date.

After this the board adjourned to meet at the same place Monday, June 5, at 5:30 o'clock.

ORDINANCE FORBIDDING DAMAGE OR DEFACING ELECTRIC LIGHT POLES AND FIXTURES, ETC.
