CITY MARSHAL

CUT BY NEGRESS

John D. Conlee is Victim of Enraged Negro Woman Who Wields Knife to Good Advantage.

Quite a lot of excitement was caused on lower Main Street Saturday night about 9 o'clock when a negro woman by the name of Drusilla Hudley attacked City Marshal John D. Conlee with a pocket knife and cut him up pretty badly. There were two wounds inflicted on the right side of the marshal's face, one started high up on his cheek bone and ranged down toward his chin, cutting through and exposing his teeth, and the other one went straight across his face about middle ways of his jaw, but was not so deep as the other. His right hand was also pretty badly cut, while he was warding off the licks from the enraged woman. Interference on the part of County Judge J. T. Maloney and others probably kept Mr. Conlee from killing the woman.

The following is the statement of the affair as given by the marshal: "Saturday night about 9 o'clock Drusilla Hudley and Fannie Smith were standing in front of Frank's restaurant in the Zanetti block, and were obstructing the sidewalk and asking negro men as they passed to treat them and were talking loud and laughing and causing quite a bit of disturbance. They had been at this place for some time and I walked up to them and told Drusilla that she would either have to get in the restaurant, go home or at least get off the street. When she was told this she began to give me back talk and I slapped her in the face with my open hand and she jumped right toward me and as she did fell to the pavement in the street just off the walk and I grabbed her by the throat and choked her until I thought she was quieted down and would do as I had told her. I turned her loose and as she was getting back to her feet she got her knife out and open and lit right in my face with it, just like a flash. I drew my gun and hit her over the head twice just as she started to get back on the sidewalk and by this time quite a crowd of people had gathered and the woman rushed in among them. As I went around the crowd to get in front of her County Judge J. T. Maloney grabbed my automatic and about

three other white men grabbed me. A bunch of negro men had caught the woman and when I got loose from those holding me was the first chance I had to shoot her, but I realized to have killed her with the men holding her, it would have been murder. I took the knife out of her hand and walked up the street with her until I met Deputy Marshal Worley and turned her over to him and she was carried to the county jail.

Mr. Conlee went to the Bryan Hospital where his wounds were dressed and after spending the night there came home Sunday morning and was out today feeling pretty sore from the wounds. Outside of his face being badly swollen, the marshal says that he is alright and expects to be well in a short time.
