### PARTY IS BADLY SPLIT PEACE CONFERENCE FAILS

Justice Hughes Accepts the Nomination and Resigns from the Supreme Court Bench. Roosevelt has not yet Made Statement. Fairbanks is Selected as Hughes Running Mate. The Peace Conference Last Night Could Never Be Terminated. Roosevelt Nominated Unanimously in Thirty Seconds After Progressives Heard What the G. O. P. had Done.

Coliseum, Chicago, June 10.—Associate Justice Hughes of the Supreme Court of the United States was nominated by the republican national convention this afternoon at 1 o'clock unanimously on the third ballot. Before the roll call had covered half of the states, Hughes had the necessary 494 and New Jersey's vote touched the mark. Texas voted all twenty-six of her votes for Hughes. Six candidates withdrew in the course of the balloting. John Wanamaker nominated Fairbanks for vice president, which was seconded by Governor Willis of Ohio, thus practically assuring him of the nomination. Fairbanks telegraphed he would not accept.

Auditorium, Chicago, June 10.—Theodore Roosevelt was nominated by unanimous consent by the progressive convention today within thirty seconds after the republicans had nominated Justice Hughes. The announcement caused wild demonstration in the convention when Woods came to the platform and the announcement was immediately made by Chairman Robins, who tried in vain for several minutes to restore order.

Coliseum, Chicago, June 10.—Fairbanks was nominated as vice president on the republican ticket this afternoon. He has not said whether or not he would accept.

Coliseum, Chicago, June 10.—With the skies brightened and gradually falling in line of the delegates to vote for Associate Justice Hughes on the next succeeding ballot, the republican national convention was called to order for the fourth day's session at 11:49 today. Previous to getting orders, the various states caucused on the floor, deciding to throw their strength to Hughes and agreeing on Fairbanks as the nominee for vice president. Cheers followed when

Chairman Harding announced that Senator Smoot would read the report of the peace committee which presented Hughes' names to the progressives. Senator Smoot also read Roosevelt's letter to the progressives, suggesting Lodge as the man to compromise on.

Auditorium, Chicago, June 10.—With apparent determination to nominate Colonel Roosevelt, by unanimous consent as soon as possible after the convention was opened, the progressives at the opening of today's session heard Senator Perkins read the report of the peace conference and urged that the convention abide by Roosevelt's request to defer action until the other convention had passed on Senator Lodge, whom he had offered as the man for a compromise.

**Peace Conference of No Avail.**

Chicago, June 10.—The report that the republican delegates who were instructed for the favorite sons broke to Hughes when balloting began today is generally credited. The peace conferences continued last night without agreeing on any one for a leader of the two parties.

**Roosevelt Suggests Lodge.**

Oyster Bay, N. Y., June 10.—Roosevelt sent a telegram to the progressive convention today suggesting Senator Lodge of Massachusetts as a compromise candidate upon whom both the republicans and progressives could unite.

**Hughes Not Objectionable.**

Chicago, June 10.—The progressive state chairman, at a stormy meeting this morning, received a proposal from Senator Smoot. It was understood that the nomination of Hughes would not prove objectionable to the progressive leaders and they might endorse him. Roosevelt withdrawing if he was named.

**Roosevelt's Friends Are Sure He Will Accept.**

Oyster Bay, June 10.—Theodore Roosevelt would not comment on his nomination by the progressives when immediately informed of the fact this afternoon, but his friends are confident that he will accept and expect him to issue a statement later in the day.

### ALLIES CAPTURE ADDITIONAL MEN

Reports From Petrograd War Office Say That 600 Additional Men Are Taken Prisoners.

London, June 10.—The Petrograd war office announced today that the Russians had captured 97 officers and 500 men in addition to their previously announced successes against the Austrians in Volhynia and Galicia. The French have been driven out of several positions northeast of Verdun in the course of stubborn fighting, the German statement said today. The French statement says that no infantry but heavy artillery fighting is going on on the Verun front.

### ITALIAN SHIP IS TORPEDOED

Austrian Submarine Sinks Boat in Lower Adriatic—Loaded With Soldiers.

Rome, July 10.—The Italian transport, Principe Umberto, was torpedoed and sunk today by two Austrian submarines in the Lower Adriatic while carrying soldiers and war material, conveyed by destroyers. It is believed that all the troops aboard perished, according to the official admiralty statement here today.
