ELUDED BRITISH AND REACHED OUR SHORES

The Submarine Was Loaded With a Thousand Ton Cargo for American Firms—Her Captain Says the Voyage Breaks England's Rule of the Seas, That There Will Be Other Submarines Here and That a Fleet of These Boats Have Been Built for Transatlantic Trade—The Vessel Was Unarmed—On the Western Front the British and French Made Further Advances and Captured More Prisoners—The Germans Claim to Have Checked the Russian Advance.

Baltimore, Md., July 10.—Announcement that the German submarine merchantman Deutschland, reaching the Chesapeake Bay yesterday, is the first of a fleet of such craft built to ply regularly in the Transatlantic trade, was made while on a trip early to Captain Paul Konig, master of the super-submarine. "Just wait, there will be more here soon. We are going back for another cargo, and we are going to have a regular line," he said. The Deutschland ended her voyage across the Atlantic at 6:40 this morning, docking at a pier of the Eastern Forwarding Company on the outskirts of Baltimore after the health officers had inspected her in quarantine.

pagne district last night, resulting in the capture of German trenches over a five hundred metre front, the war office announced. On the Somme River front the French took a line of German positions near Barleux, together with nine hundred and fifty prisoners. The French advanced their lines south of the Somme River today a mile and a half, reaching within a mile of Peronne. French critics believe the capture of Peronne is only a question of hours.

Steady progress for the British near Ouvillers was reported in the official statement today. The British also made new advances northwest of Contal-Maison, several hundred prisoners were taken. The capture of Tronswood, Lamalsonnetto farm, and the village of Barleux by German troops was announced today from Berlin.

The Germans have checked the Russian forces which were advancing in Volhynia in the direction of Kovel, the war office announced today. The Russian troops moving toward the Stokhod line were repulsed everywhere.

Ask Close Scrutiny.

Washington, July 10.—The British and French embassies today officially called the state department's attention to the arrival of the Deutschland and asked this government to assure itself of the vessel's character. This will be done, it was announced, by the assignment of naval experts to assist the treasury department.

EMBARGO IS PARTLY LIFTED.

El Paso Headquarters Announce That Shipments May Be Made.

El Paso, Texas, July 10.—The embargo on shipments to Mexico has been lifted, it was announced at headquarters last night, on everything but munitions of war.

COMPTROLLER WILL COLLECT TAXES DUE

H. B. Terrell Estimates That \$1,000,000 is Due in Inheritance Taxes in Texas.

Austin, Texas, July 10.—It was estimated by Comptroller H. B. Terrell today that there is at present over \$1,000,000 due the State of Texas in inheritance taxes since that tax law was enacted in 1907. The money is owed, he said, by 53 estates in Texas. The comptroller will, it is understood, ask the next legislature to give him authority to collect that tax, a power which he does not now hold.

PRESIDENT AROUSED ENTHUSIASM

Urges Business Men to Carry Justice and Fair Dealing into Ports of the World.

Detroit, Mich., July 10.—President Wilson aroused great enthusiasm at the World's Salesmanship Congress today by urging that business men carry justice and fair dealing into the ports of the world. Particularly those of Mexico and thereby establish confidence in American principle.

TWO ECLIPSES WILL BE SEEN IN JULY.

There will be an interesting partial eclipse of the moon on the night of July 14-15, about 80 per cent of the moon's surface being covered by the earth's shadow. In that of January 20 of this year only 14 per cent of the moon's surface was covered. The beginning will be visible generally in Africa, Southwestern Europe, the Atlantic Ocean, North America (except the more western portions), South America and the South Pacific Ocean; the ending will be visible generally in the Atlantic Ocean, North and South America and the South Pacific Ocean.

An eclipse of the moon can only occur at full moon, or at "opposition," it is termed; that is, when the moon in its orbit about the earth is on the opposite side of the earth to the sun, all three bodies being in line—the moon, the earth and the sun—the moon passing through the earth's shadow. As the earth's shadow at the point through which the moon passes is nearly three times the diameter of the moon, it will be seen a total eclipse may occur when these bodies are not in exact alignment. The length of the earth's shadow is approximately 837,000 miles and that of the moon 232,000 miles.

There will be a partial eclipse of the sun on July 29 but it will not be visible in the United States.

FORESTRY NOTES.

From the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.
About 700,000,000 feet of timber was cut on the national forests in 1915.

Experiments with jack pine have shown that it is well suited for making kraft paper. On some of the national forests this tree is used to plant land which is too poor to grow other timber.

A new fire-fighting tool has been invented by a forest ranger in California which consists of an interchangeable-hoe and rake. It is said to be the best tool of the sort yet devised.

The use of osage orange for making dyes promises to be extensive. The forest products laboratory is making a census which shows that the supply of the wood is more than ample to meet present needs.

In parts of the west the forest service is co-operating with the weather bureau in distributing weather forecasts to the settlers. By the use of forest service telephones many isolated sections are reached which could not otherwise receive the reports. Sheep men owning bands of lambing ewes will be particularly benefited, as the warnings enable them to get their sheep under shelter and avoid the losses sometimes caused by late spring storms.

BOY KING WAS FORCED OFF THRONE

Action Was Caused by Revolt Which He Was Accused of Fomenting.

Paris, July 10.—Duy-tan, the 16-year-old king of the French protectorate of Annam on the China Sea, has been dethroned as a result of the revolt in Quang-Ngai, which he is accused of having fomented. He was succeeded by Prince Bun-Dao, who has just been crowned.

WILL ORGANIZE HEALTH DISTRICTS

Attorney General's Department Rules That Small Towns and Rural Districts Can Have Health Boards.

Austin, Texas, July 10.—According to a ruling of the attorney general's department, unincorporated towns and rural districts in Texas may organize health districts and appoint a board of health for such a district. This ruling is said to be of considerable importance in view of the wave of interest in public health matters that has swept over Texas during the past several years. County commissioners are authorized to make appropriations for the organization and maintenance of these boards of health, the ruling also declares.

WARNING SENT OF BORDER RAID

Washington Advised of Bandit Approach Toward Big Bend Country. Carranza to Co-operate.

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, July 10.—A second warning that bandits were headed for the Texas Big Bend country was given the state department by Ambassador Arredondo today. He told Acting Secretary Polk his government had given him definite information that bandits were headed toward Bonquillas, and promised the co-operation of the Carranza forces.

Villa in Jiminez.

El Paso, Texas, July 10.—Francisco Villa appeared in Jiminez after that town's capture by bandits, according to La Democrata, a Carranza organ published in Chihuahua City, a copy of which was received today.

SOUTH AMERICAN PEACE THREATENED

Peru and Venezuela May Go to War With Ecuador and Colombia Over Lands.

Brownsville, Texas, July 10.—Official dispatches today in Latin-American diplomatic quarters say a secret agreement has been made between Peru and Venezuela with the object of taking vast tracts of land, the ownership of which they will dispute with Colombia and Ecuador. Grave fears for the peace of the nations involved are expressed.
