SOME HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Evaporation From Wet Cloth in Draft Over Butter Will Keep It Hard.

If cabbage is soaked in cold, salted water for an hour before cooking it will have a most delicious flavor, and the odor will be less disagreeable.

When pouring jelly or canned fruit into tumblers or glass jars set the jars first on a damp cloth. This goes a long way toward preventing their breaking.

A lettuce soup is made with a head of lettuce boiled until soft, then put into a quart of milk and heated in a double boiler to the boiling point. Strain and add paprika, salt and pepper.

If you have no ice and wish to keep butter hard, set it on a board across a tub nearly filled with water. Cover the butter with a coarse cloth, the ends of which fall into the water, then place the whole in a current of air. The evaporation will keep the butter hard.

The neck of veal cooked until tender, then lifted from the stock, cut into pieces and flavored with allspice, ground cloves, cinnamon, pepper and salt, then mixed with the hot stock and packed in a square earthen or porcelain dish, will make a delicious cold meat for slicing.

COURTS SHOULD BE REGENERATED WITH THE SPIRIT OF JUSTICE

LEGAL PROFESSION HAS DEPARTED FROM ORIGINAL PRINCIPLES AND LOFTY IDEALS.

"The lawyer is so important in our domestic, commercial and political life and his services are of such a character that he should be made a bonded salaried public official; the number limited to the public need, and what it is willing to pay for, and his activities confined to the Administration of Justice.

"The profession must renounce commercialism, and return to its original principles and lofty ideals. Let justice be the beacon light and all rules and precedents subordinated to her attainment. The courts must be regenerated by and with the spirit of justice. The judiciary may then sing that good old hymn, 'Amazing Justice how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now am found, blind, but now I see.'"

"The trial of a law suit is a fierce combat between two or more lawyers, which is more often determined by the astuteness, the aggressiveness and the personality of the lawyer, than by the merits of the cause. It is almost as probable that justice would be obtained by a physical combat between the lawyers as by a mental. We have not improved very much over the ancient method of determining truth by walking blindfolded over heated plough shares. In the case of crime this ancient method has the advantage at least of making impossible the 'unwritten law,' and the 'hip-pocket' defenses, which are the open doors by which so many red-handed, cold-blooded murderers escape.

Redeeming Features of Our System. "The jury and the justice of the peace court are the two redeeming features of our present system. The jury tries to arrive at the justice of the case notwithstanding the protest of the lawyers, and the limitations of the court. There should be radical changes in the qualifications of jurors, the number should be reduced to five or seven and a majority should be empowered to return a verdict. No criminal, no defendant seeking delay and no lawyer desiring to hinder or obstruct justice wants a majority verdict. A speedy trial can usually be obtained in the justice court, and the procedure is informal and simple. As a rule, the less law the justice of the peace pretends to know, the better justice he makes. 50-
