CAPTURED MORE GERMAN FRONT LINE TRENCHES

French on Western Front Fighting With Great Desperation and many German Trenches Fall Into Their Hands--About Verdun and on Both Sides of the Somme River, Terrific Bombardment is Continued. The Austrians Hurl Great Stones Down a Mountain Side and Defeated Italian Attacks. Russians Take Important Point in Caucasus. The British Captured a Large German Submarine of the U-34 Type.

(By Associated Press.)
Columbus, N. M., July 20.—A report reached Columbus Wednesday that Villa is leading a large party of bandits toward Minaca, 85 miles west of Chihuahua City, on the line of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway.

The rumor states that the bandit leader has discarded his crutches and is riding a horse.

ZOO FISHERMEN LOSE LIVES IN MONSOON

London, July 20.—Two hundred fishermen lost their lives in a great monsoon off the coast of Colombo, Ceylon, this morning, according to Exchange Telegraph dispatches. More than a hundred small boats containing fishermen failed to return to shore after the great hurricane.

London, July 20.—French attacks in the Somme River region were delivered last night on both sides of the river. On the north bank the trenches in the Hardecourt section were taken, while south of the river all the German front line trenches between Barleux and Soyecourt fell into French hands, Paris reports today.

By hurling great stones down the mountain sides, the Austrians repulsed three strong Italian attacks near Borcola Pass, the Austrian official statement says.

In the Verdun region there was a continuous bombardment of the Av-

court and Chatancourt sectors on the left bank of the Meuse, with grenade engagement northeast of Hill 304.

Heavy fighting continues on the Somme River front, with the British gaining ground at Delvalle and Longuval, the London office announced.

The Petrograd war office announces that Kugi, an important point in the Caucasus, was occupied by the Russians Tuesday.

Repeated French attacks south of the Somme River were repulsed by the Germans, Berlin announced today. The British and French artillery fire developed to a pitch of the greatest intensity on both sides of the Somme.

GERMAN SUB CAPTURED.

London, July 20.—Great Britain has captured a German submarine of the U-35 class, Thomas McNamara, financial secretary of the admiralty, announced in the House of Commons today. The boat will be brought to London to be viewed by the public.

TRYING TO ADOPT THEIR PLATFORM

National Prohibitionists Trying to Adopt Platform Without Distributing Among Delegates.

St. Paul, July 20.—Efforts to affect the adoption of the resolution committee's draft of a platform without first printing and distributing it to the delegates, precipitated the first contention in the national prohibition convention today. While this matter was being argued the convention recessed until this afternoon. The morning session was cut very short. An effort to inject an anti-Catholic declaration into the platform caused the resolutions committee to go into an executive session while a bitter debate raged in the convention hall.

CAPTAIN KOENIG HAS ON UNIFORM

Baltimore, July 20.—Prepared to leave port at any moment, Captain Paul Koenig, commander of the Deutschland, put on his uniform this morning for the first time since the under-seat boat arrived here several days ago. For several hours this morning the commander studied charts of outlets to the Atlantic Ocean. Captain Koenig said that he would not leave the ship again, and indicated an early departure, but would not give out anything definite. The engines and all the machinery on the boat have been given a final test and were found to be in perfect condition.

FLOURING MILL TO BEGIN OPERATION

Announcement Was Made This Morning That Bryan Flouring Mill Will Start in Few Days.

The announcement was made this morning by Mr. H. T. Lawler, Jr., that the new flouring mill which has recently been completed would start operation in a very few days. The management has received an order from the Interstate Commerce Commission for milling in transit, which gives them the very lowest freight rate on wheat and it puts them in a position to make flour at a price that they can compete with other local mills over Texas.

The machinery which has been installed in the mill is of the very latest type and is electrically operated. The cleaning machines which the wheat will pass through are the best made and the grain is cleaned and re-cleaned three times before it is made into flour. The storing capacity of the plant is very large and will enable the mill to carry a very large amount of raw material on hand at all times. The first car of wheat which is to be used by the mill is already on hand and others will follow just as soon as the H. & T. C. completes its spur track for the use and accommodation of the mill.

HAVE VILLA SURROUNDED

Chihuahua City, July 20.—Villa is at Amador, 30 miles southwest of the Durango line, with his band, according to a message to Gen. Trevino from Gen. Ramos today. Trevino says there are about 800 in the band, which the defactoists have surrounded and should capture or annihilate in a short time. The information was meagre on account of difficult telegraphing.
