FARMERS CONGRESS HAS BUSY DAY

Thursday's Program Very Profitable.
Attendance Increased and Depart-
ments Doing Good Work.

An ambitious program for the de-
velopment of physical equipment, at-
tendance and service for the Agricul-
tural and Mechanical College for the
next decade was outlined by Clarence
Ousley, director of extension service,
who delivered the address of welcome
for President Bizzell to the Farmers'
Congress.

The response to the address of wel-
come was delivered by E. W. Kirk-
patrick of McKinney, who declared
that one girl in the canning club is
worth more than all of the politicians
who have kept this State in a turmoil
for the past 60 days. That home own-
ership will make for a greater patriot-
ism, was the statement of the speaker.

He also told of the establishment of
the Agricultural and Mechanical Col-
lege and its growth, and also spoke of
the organization of the congress 19
years ago. A plea for the develop-
ment of the rural schools was voiced
by President Gorham in his annual
address.

Better buildings and better teachers
are essential, he said. Education of
the country boy and girl in the coun-
try will give them greater ambitions
for improvement of rural life.

Consolidation of all agencies work-
ing along agricultural lines at the Ag-
ricultural and Mechanical College also
was urged. The report of Secretary-
Treasurer C. O. Moser of Dallas
showed the financial affairs of the
Congress to be in good shape.

sion of the short course congress at
the Agricultural and Mechanical Col-

and bad designs in wall paper, in-
terior decorations, pictures and fur-
niture were shown by Miss Gearing,
whose plea was for the simple, sub-
stantial design.

There are 400 women and girls who
are here in attendance on the annual
short course and congress who are re-
ceiving good instructions. There is
Miss Scott of Virginia, perhaps the
ablest canning club worker in the
employ of the United States Depart-
ment of Agriculture. Miss Scott gave
a demonstration yesterday afternoon
in the principles of meat cooking.
Miss Cornelia Simpson of the Agri-
cultural and Mechanical College ex-
tension staff, and Miss Bernice Carter
in charge of the club work in Texas,
are other members of the staff. Their
schedule is full and their addresses
are just as full of seasonable advice.

The address of welcome was deliv-
ered by Dean E. J. Kyle and was an-
swered by J. W. Randall of Austin.
The real meaning of efficiency in gov-
ernment and other service was the
subject of an address by W. A. McEl-
roy, secretary of the Bryan Commer-
cial Club. There are 50 in attendance.

The Beekeepers' Association, of
which J. B. King is president and Prof.
Bulay of Barnum secretary, executed
its program as published. It was
learned from the proceedings that this
has been a most successful year for
the Texas beekeepers. Louis H.
Scholl of New Braunfels delivered an
instructive address on the essentials
of successful beekeeping. H. E. Gra-
ham of Gause attributed the great
percentage of failures in the apary
industry to the lack of determination
and sticking qualities in those who
embark in this industry. Both Mr.
Graham and Mr. Scholl said the bees
will pull you through if you will stick
with them in unfavorable as well as
in favorable seasons.

The Texas dairymen met and elect-
ed officers as follows: H. A. Clapp,
president, Collegeport; W. C. Lebar-
ron, vice president, Sherman; R. L.
Pou, secretary-treasurer, Prof. J. W.
Ridgeway of the Agricultural and Me-
chanical College and former secretary
of the association, was re-elected a
member on the executive committee
of the Farmers' Congress.

B. F. Frazier of Cleburne and Mr.
Lester of Orange were also elected
members of the executive committee
of the association.

SERBIAN OFFENSIVE AGAINST BULGARIANS

The Russians Have Begun Operations on the
Western Front and in the First Battle Drove
the Germans From Their Trenches and Capt-
ured a Lot of Prisoners—No Decisive Gains
Were Made by Either the British, French or
Germans—The Russians Are Still Advanc-
ing on the Eastern Front—The Serbians Have
Begun an Offensive Against the Bulgarians.
Berlin Reports a Naval Engagement Between
German Submarines and British Patrol Boats
and Says Two British Ships Were Sunk.

London, July 28.—The Russians re-
connoitering at Auberive in Cham-
pagne, says the French official state-
ment, penetrated the German trench-
es and cleared them with hand gran-
ades. The Russians took some pris-
oners.

The German attempt near Lihons,
north of Chalones, was arrested by
French infantry fire.

On the right bank of the Meuse in
Verdun, German preparations to at-
tack Thiaumont were stopped by ar-
tillery fire.

The British troops captured the en-
tire village of Delville, London re-
ports this afternoon. All the Ger-
mans defending the position were
driven out.

Berlin claims the strong British at-
tack on the German position in Fou-
reaux Wood, in the Somme River
front, broke down under German fire.

A Havas Salonica dispatch says the
Serbians have begun an offensive
against the Bulgarians in Greece, oc-
cupying a series of heights and main-
taining their positions despite Bulgar-
ian counter attacks.

The Russians continue to advance
successfully in southern Volhynia,
Petrograd announces, saying also the

Russian Caucasian army is advancing.

Attacks by two Russian army corps
on the German positions near Baran-
ovichi, were delivered yesterday but
failed to gain ground. The battle is
still in progress, Berlin announced this
afternoon.

The Russians resumed their attack
in Southern Volhynia and pierced
General Von Linsingens lines north
of Svinichy, but are being vigor-
ously counter attacked by the Germans.

ANOTHER SEA FIGHT.
Berlin, July 28. (Bulletin)—In a
naval battle between German subma-
rines and four British patrol boats off
the coast of Scotland, two British ves-
sels were sunk according to the Over-
Seas News Agency.

Girl Presented Medal.
Paris, July 28.—At a special cere-
mony today in the British embassy,
Emilienne Moreau, an eighteen year
old girl known as the "Heroine of
Loose," was presented with a British
medal for bravery, and was given the
order of St. John of Jerusalem. She
attended the wounded under fire for
twenty-four hours.

PARALYSIS EPI- DEMIC UNCHECKED

New York, July 28.—The infantile
paralysis epidemic remains unchecked
today. There were 35 deaths and 104
new cases reported during the last 24
hours.

RANGE OF VISION FROM AEROPLANE

Territory That Can Be Surveyed by
Aviators at Certain Height.

(By Associated Press.)
Paris, July 28.—An airship at 4000
yards height is able to make obser-
vations over a surface of ground 500
miles in diameter, according to infor-
mation collected in the discussion of
the services that aircraft has rendered
during the war. An aviator at
1,000 yards height has within his vis-
ion a zone 75 miles in diameter. Ac-
cordingly, the Abbe Moreaux of the
Bourges Observatory has figured out
that an aviator of the entrenched
camp of Paris at 1,000 yards height
is able to see as far as Chartres, Or-
leans, Beauvais, Amiens, and the Ger-
man front beyond Cologne, with the
city of Leon.

This visibility, calculated mathe-
matically, is rarely possible however,
in practice, because atmospheric con-
ditions are seldom just right.

MEASLES FOUND AMONG GUARDSMEN

a British cruiser within the Virginia
Capes last Tuesday came today from
Commander Shane of the United
States collier, Neptune. He said that
he could not identify the cruiser, but
that he saw her leaving the Capes
about 3 o'clock in the morning.

I. & G. N. FILL STARTS TOMORROW

Large Steam Shovel and Other Equip-
ment Arrives From Palestine
This Morning—Work to be
Pushed.

R. L. Peck, the popular and accom-
modating station agent of the I. & G.
N. railway of Bryan has been a very
busy man today getting things in
shape for the large crew of workmen
who arrived this morning from Pale-
stine to make the big fill on North
Bryan street which this road is going
to do. There were many small things
to be arranged before the work could
be begun and it fell to Mr. Peck to ar-
range these matters.

The equipment that arrived in
city this morning from Palestine con-
sists of a very large steam shovel,
a big dirt spreader and thirty Lidger-
wood cars for hauling the dirt. The
shovel was located this afternoon on
a side track about one and one-half
miles north of the city where the dirt
will be procured for the fill. The
work will be under the supervision of
Division Superintendent J. C. Resch
and train master E. E. Goforth of
Mart. The actual dirt hauling will
start tomorrow morning and accord-
ing to Mr. Resch it will take between
750 and 1000 car loads to make the
fill. They can, with the equipment
at hand, put in place about 75 cars
per day and they want, if possible, to
complete the job in ten or eleven
days.
