## Germany to Confiscate Red Cross Supplies

### CLAIMS ENGLAND IS RE- SPONSIBLE FOR ACTION

Germany Will Hereafter Deny the Free Passage of Red Cross Supplies and Her Naval and Submarine Commanders Have Been Ordered to Confiscate Same—British Treatment of Red Cross Supplies Is Given as the Cause for This Action—German Zeppelins Make Another Raid on England and Scotland Coasts Killing and Wounding Twenty-six—More Than Five Million War Prisoners Are Held by the Warring Nations.

Amsterdam, Aug. 9.—A published memorandum issued by Germany states that owing to the British treatment of Red Cross supplies, Germany will not in future allow free passage for such supplies. The German naval forces will be ordered to confiscate such supplies.

#### Many War Prisoners.

New York, Aug. 9.—More than five million prisoners, double the number of men engaged in any previous war that the world has known, are confined in the prison camps of the belligerent nations, according to Dr. John R. Mott, general secretary of the International Committee of the Young Men's Christian Association, arriving today from Copenhagen. With approximately one million, seven hundred and fifty thousand, Germany has the greatest number.

#### Another Air Raid.

London, Aug. 9.—Three women and children were killed in a German air-ship raid on the east coast of England and the southeast coast of Scotland, according to the war office. Fourteen were injured. From seven to ten Zeppelins participated in the raid, dropping a hundred and sixty bombs. There were 23 casualties.

### SHERIFF CATCHES NEGRO HORSE THIEF

Albert Rim Who Is Charged With Horse and Cow Theft and Burglary Is Arrested This Morning.

Sheriff T. C. Nunn made a very important arrest this morning near Mudville when he caught Albert Rim, a negro who is charged with stealing a horse and cow and breaking into a store and stealing some merchandise.

It is alleged that the negro stole a cow some few days ago from Paul Hijik, near Benchley, and carried her to Hearne and tried to dispose of her to a local butcher there. He priced the cow so low that the butcher suspected something and went to call an officer. While gone for this purpose the negro turned the cow loose and got away. Later he broke into a store north of Calvert and stole some merchandise, including some candy and tobacco, a pair of pants and a .41 Colt's six-shooter. He made his getaway from this and later stole a horse from Alonzo Carter near Wellborn and rode him away, and the sheriff's department has been looking for him for nearly a week and this morning located him near Mudville, in the Brazos Bottom, riding the horse while trying to get away.

The negro claims to be from Milan County, and says he is only 19 years old. Regardless of his age, however, he is located in the Brazos County jail and will be held pending investigation by the grand jury next month.

### EPIDEMIC IN N. Y. GROWING WORSE

Fifty-seven Children Die in Twenty-four Hours—Largest Number Since Epidemic Started.

New York, Aug. 9.—The infantile paralysis epidemic killed 57 children during the past 24 hours ending this morning at 10 o'clock. This breaks all previous records for a single day. There were 183 new cases reported during the same period of time.

T. Austin Chapter R. A. M., this city. He was past master here 52 years ago, and is now 80 years of age. Many visitors were present from other lodges in the county. After the business session of the lodge a melon feast was had and those present pronounced the meeting one of the best had in many months.

### MUCH TOBACCO CON- SUMED IN OKLAHOMA

Internal Revenue Report Show That More Tobacco Was Used Last Year Than in Any Other Year.

Oklahoma, City, Okla., Aug. 9.—More cigars, cigarettes and pipe tobacco were smoked in Oklahoma and more chewing tobacco consumed during the fiscal year just ended than during any previous corresponding period, according to reports of Herbert L. Bolen, collector of internal revenues, just issued.

More than 500 tobacco dealers paid special licenses for that period, the report adds.

New York, Aug. 9.—The national conference of railroad managers today again rejected the Brotherhoods' demands and proposed the submission of all differences to the United States Board of Mediation and Conciliation. ### PAVING CREW HAS MOVED MACHINERY

After Completion of Work on Anderson Street Crew Moves Machinery to East Anderson.

The large crew of paving men who are working for the Kaw Paving Co. laying the concrete base for the street paving in the residence district of the city, on yesterday completed their work on West Anderson street and moved their big mixing plant last night to East Anderson street and early this morning work was started laying the base for the pavement on this end of the street in front of the fire station.

With so much hustle and improvement going on over the city of course this one machine is hardly noticeable over the rest but in conversation with the foreman of this crew this morning a reporter for The Eagle was given some idea of the expense incurred in operating this machine. There are about 25 men working at the machine all the time and several wagons are kept busy hauling gravel and cement. There are four big husky negroes wearing rubber boots busy all the time with large iron rakes spreading the concrete as it is poured from the machine. The mixing plant consumes from 75 to 100 loads of gravel per day and almost a solid car load of cement. To any one who has not availed himself of the opportunity to see this machine in operation it will be well worth his time.
