GREECE WAS FINALLY DRAGGED INTO THE WAR

Fighting Continues on the Salonika Front and Greeks Are Fighting the Bulgarians Which Brings Greece Into the War on the Side of the Allies—Russian Troops Are Disembarking Today at Salonika, Which is Further Proof of a Gigantic Movement in the Balkans by the Allies—Rumania Is Again Hanging in the Balance and Her Entry Into the War Siding With the Allies Is Daily Expected—British and French Made Gains on the French Front—No Change in Galicia.

PREDICTED TEXAS LANDSLIDE TO G. O. P.

H. F. MacGregor Said Hughes May Carry Lone Star State, Due to Mexican Policy.
(By Associated Press.)
Chicago, Aug. 22.—H. F. MacGregor, Republican National committeeman from Texas, told those in charge of the Western Republican campaign headquarters that he believed there was a possibility of Hughes carrying Texas in November.
"There is no question but that the sentiment among the voters of Texas is opposed to the administration of President Wilson," said Mr. MacGregor. "If this sentiment were registered at the polls there is no question but that Mr. Hughes would carry the state. There is no certainty, of course, that this will be done, although there is a possibility of it. The people of Texas are especially dissatisfied with the Democratic administration because of its Mexican policy. Mr. Hughes' statement of that policy is regarded as being eminently fair and correct. Living on the border as we do the people of Texas have had an opportunity to observe the actual working out of that policy.
"The sentiment among the Democratic voters of the state was expressed in the recent primary vote on candidates for senator when former Governor Colquitt, who has vigorously opposed President Wilson's policy, was the highest man on the ticket. The vote is regarded as significant when it is remembered that Texas has three members of President Wilson's cabinet. Another significant feature of the situation was that only about 40 per cent of the Democratic vote was registered in the primary. Texas, of course, has always been a rock-ribbed Democratic state, and its possible inclusion in the Republican column seems almost incredible, but it will be well for political observers to keep their eyes on Texas in this campaign."

GUARDSMEN STUDY SPANISH LANGUAGE

Y. M. C. A. Instruct Work of Teaching Soldiers How to Talk With Mexicans on the Border.

Brownsville, Texas, Aug. 22.—Studying Spanish has become the popular pastime of the day among the National guardsmen stationed in the Brownsville district of the border patrol.
Unable to understand even the primer enunciations of the so-called "spigs" and other Mexicans with whom they are daily coming in contact, a number of guardsmen resolved to master the difficulty. The movement was given impetus by the Young Men's Christian Association organization on the border. Several teachers from Brownsville and surrounding towns volunteered their services.
Almost nightly, as a consequence, classes are held in the Y. M. C. A. buildings which are attended by from a score to fifty willing students in that language which so mystified them on their arrival.
The "spig" is a term given to un-Americanized Mexicans by the early arrivals of soldiery some years ago. It grew out of the almost invariable Latin answer to American questions: "No 'spig' English."

WILSON OBJECTS TO LITERACY TEST

Let It Be Known He Would Veto It If Came to Him With That Provision.

Washington, Aug. 22.—President Wilson let it be known today he would veto the immigration bill if it came before him again with the literacy test, and with that the Senate defeated a motion to take up the measure, and returned to the consideration of the rest of the bill.

London, Aug. 22.—Fighting on the Salonika front, where it is becoming apparent the Entente Allies have started an extensive offensive movement, is becoming more general. This was evidenced today by the landing of the first contingent of Russian troops at Salonika and the participation in the fighting against the Bulgarians by Greeks. The Greeks have been fighting in the vicinity of Serres since Sunday morning, according to an Athens dispatch received in London, while the offensive has been developing from an Entente Allies standpoint.
The Bulgarians, said to be under command of German Field Marshal Von Mackensen, are advancing on the Stuma valley, occupying Demir Hizar after routing the British and French near Serres, according to the Sofia official statement. The Bulgarians also occupied Kassotra and Corytae in the Doiran sector the Serbian troops captured Forts Kaimakalar and Cucurli.
Progress was made by the French on the Somme front, in the outskirts of Clerly, Paris announces. South of the river the French captured the trenches near Estress and Sovecourt. The British troops on the Somme front advanced along a line half a mile long in the Pozieres region, and also made an advance near Leipsic, said London today.
The Russian army of the Caucasus has gained further ground from the Turks, capturing considerable territory west of Lake Van, in Armenia, Petrograd announced today. On the main Galician battle front there is no change.

All Serbian positions on Malka Nizen Plania, east of Banica, on the Macedonia front, have been captured by the troops of the Central powers, says the Berlin announcement today. The French, the announcement adds, have been driven out of Buthkova and Thamicia.

ROUMANIA IN DOUBT.

Berlin, Aug. 22.—The Budapest Azest, which is usually well informed on the Roumanian situation, today prints a dispatch from its Bucharest correspondent, saying the agitation for war, which in the last few days has been at fever heat, has suddenly cooled down. It is stated that possibly the end of mobilization is responsible for the change.
Note—This is the first hint of Roumanian mobilization that has been permitted to pass the allied censorship.

WOMAN SPY EXECUTED.

Paris, Aug. 22.—The execution of a woman spy named Felice Pfaut, at Marseilles, was reported today in Havas dispatches.

GERMAN BATTLESHIP SUNK.

London, Aug. 22.—The British official announcement this afternoon says it is believed a German battleship of the Massau class has been sunk by the British submarine E-22.

TO ACCEPT WILSON'S PLAN IS THE BELIEF

Railroad Presidents Are Working on Counter Proposal Today, but Believed Will Accept Plan.

Washington, Aug. 22.—While the railroad presidents are working today on a counter proposal to President Wilson's plan for averting the great railroad strike, the Cabinet went over the situation fully today. The announcement was made that the belief of the Cabinet was that in the end the railroads would accept the President's plan as already outlined.

W. J. BRYAN WILL SPEAK FOR WILSON

Former Secretary of State Will Start Tour for Democracy About September 15th in Ohio.
(By Associated Press.)
New York, Aug. 22.—William Jennings Bryan's speaking tour in behalf of Woodrow Wilson and Democracy will start about September 15th, probably in Ohio, and will continue until election day in November. This announcement was made from the National Democratic headquarters today.

HOUSE REPASSED THE ARMY BILL

Sections Which Caused the President's Veto Were Eliminated in Revised Form.

Washington, Aug. 22.—Without the revised articles of war, to portions of which President Wilson objected, the House today repassed the former army appropriation bill. The Senate is expected to act later on it. President Wilson vetoed the bill because of portions it contains not being according to his ideas.

FREIGHT SERVICE ON THE B. & C. T. I.

Inauguration of Daily Freight Service Is Announced by Management. To Begin This Week.

A party of railroad officials of the Southern Pacific system and the H. & T. C. spent yesterday in the city and made a trip on the Bryan & Central Texas interurban road down as far as Johnpark. The party consisted of E. B. Cushing, assistant general manager of the Southern Pacific lines; J. W. Greep, receiver for the B. & C. T. I.; J. B. Barry, superintendent of the Austin branch of the H. & T. C.; Foreman Smith of the S. P. Bridge department, and the H. & T. C. roadmaster. These gentlemen, accompanied by Manager Levinson of the local road, made the inspection trip, and after a conference was held it was announced that a freight service would be inaugurated on the 25th or 26th of this month.

A large bridge crew will arrive this afternoon and will at once start the work of reinforcing the bridges along this line so as to permit heavy locomotives to cross them.
This arrangement will be of great benefit to the land holders in the Brazos Bottom and The Eagle congratulates Mr. Levinson on getting the service through.

Ellis, the accommodating baggage man for this road, in speaking of the crowd this morning, said that from the fuss they were making around the platform you would think there were several hundred of them, when the fact is there were only about thirty-five.

MEXICAN DISEASES TO BE KEPT OUT

As a Preventive Dr. H. C. Hall has a Most Rigid Examination and a Very Thorough Fumigation.

Laredo, Tex., Aug. 22.—As a preventive from introduction of disease from Mexico, all passengers and freight entering the United States from the southern republic undergo thorough inspections at this border point.

Passengers are examined rigidly, and when any doubt exists as to their cleanliness, they are given a gaseous bath and their heads are treated to kill lice. A vinegar shampoo is often used.

All freight cars from Mexico, whether loaded or empty, are placed on the international railway bridge at 6 a. m. daily and are there fumigated with hydrocyanic acid gas, which is deadly to all forms of animal and vegetable life. After undergoing fumigation for the period of one hour, freight is then ready for the attention of customs inspectors, who invariably appear at 9 o'clock.

Supervision of all health regulations is in charge of Dr. H. C. Bull, state quarantine officer at this point, who takes precedence over attaches of the United States public health and marine hospital service.

After all the boosting and pulling that the members of the Commercial Association had done to advertise the trip advertising the regular monthly trades day, which will start on the first Monday in next month, they were forced to call it off this morning on account of the heavy rains in and around the city. In referring to same this morning Secretary McElroy said: "We regret very much not being able to make the trip, but we feel that the money we have spent for advertising is not all lost, as it went for good purposes. We have at least let the people know that we are going to have the trades day every month and it will be my purpose yet to make a trip if same can possibly be arranged."
