Manager Levinson of the Bryan College Interurban Experiencing Trouble in Completing Work.

With the fall season now right at hand and so much improvement under way in the city, much difficulty is being experienced in securing labor to carry on the work. Manager Levinson of the College Interurban is experiencing no little trouble along this line. Several weeks since the work of removing the track to the center of Dallas street in connection with the paving was started but same has been at a standstill now for several days on account of inability to secure labor. This gentleman says that all the negroes have gone to the cotton patch and he is simply up against it. Mr. Joe Hunter who is also connected with the road has just returned from North Texas where he spent several days trying to get men but his trip was fruitless. He is now in Louisiana trying in every way possible to get help. Mr. Levinson says that it is bothering him considerably to think that he has the work started and it is now impossible to get a man to turn his hand.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE AT WORK

Plans to Be Laid for Re-Naming Streets, Putting Up Street Signs and Numbering Houses.

A meeting of the City Development Committee of the Commercial Association was held this morning with Chairman A. W. Wilkerson presiding. The meeting was called with reference to the City mail delivery which has been promised the city of Bryan on November 1st, provided certain requirements were met. The Development Committee decided the best thing to do was to hold a meeting Thursday night at the Commercial Club's council room, of the citizenship of Bryan. City Engineer A. S. Adams has been named chairman of the meeting and will be present. The purpose of this meeting is to confer about changing the names of some of the streets in the city, which has been agitated for some time. The fact that street signs will have to be foreseen will also play a big part in securing the mail service. Houses will have to be numbered. It is the desire of this committee that every citizen of Bryan who is interested or who can lend any assistance to the committee be present. The purpose of this meeting will be to lay plans for the work and submit same to the City Council at its next regular meeting. Come out and help make a city out of Bryan.
