GAINED OVER RUSSIAN AND RUMANIAN FORCES

The German Emperor Sends a Personal Message of Victory Over Russian and Rumanian Troops—This However, Was Several Days Ago and the Allies Are Still Winning at All Points—The British Have Captured Several Villages On the Western Front Which Berlin Concedes—The British Are Making Greater Gains Than at Any Time Since the Drive Began in July.—The Serbians Put the Bulgarians to Flight on the Macedonian Front and They Were Also Defeated by the Allies.

London, Sept. 16.—German counterattacks were made on the French lines both north and south of the Somme last night, but were unsuccessful, the Paris war office announced today.

An official telegram from Emperor William to the Empress says the Teutonic allies in Dobruja gained a decisive victory over Russian and Rumanian forces.

As a result of the British offensive north of the Somme river, begun Wednesday on a six-mile front, they now hold entirely the villages of Courcellette, Martinpuich and Fleeres, London announced this afternoon.

British army officers generally speak of Friday as the best day for the British army since the offensive began on the Somme front. With the exception of the inception of the movement, the attack begun yesterday was the most extensive of any in the ten weeks of battle. The British push was largely down hill, where they put behind them high ground whose slopes gave them shelter for their guns and observation points for the artillery fire.

The German statement today concedes the loss of Courcellette, Martinpuich and Fleeres to the British, but says the town of Combes is held by the Germans in the face of strong British attacks.

Another German statement says the Bulgarians on the Macedonian front occupied new positions after losing Malkaizo in a battle with the entente troops.

BULGARIANS ROUTED.

Paris, Sept. 16.—(Bulletin)—The Serbian troops put the Bulgarians to rout in a fight on the western end of the Macedonian front, advancing six miles northeast of Florina, where, the official announcement says, the Russians and French also defeated the Bulgarians.

Washington, Sept. 16.—German Ambassador Von Bernstorff today informed the State department the German government would regard as "null and void any loan Belgium had negotiated in the United States during German occupation of that country.

Russian Influence in Rumania, Berlin, Sept. 16.—The Vossische Zeitung says Russia induced Rumania to prohibit the sale of liquors and got her consent to appoint Russians as members of the Rumanian secret police, the department of finance and the administration of the railroads.

FLOUR USED TO EXTINGUISH FIRE

Fritz commenced scooping flour on the fire with his hands and soon had the blazing stove extinguished. The fire department made a quick response but were not needed upon their arrival.

COMMERCIAL CLUB AFTER GAS PLANT

Big Concern Operating Gas Plants in Texas Has Been Interested and Will Visit City Next Week.

SYNOD OF TEXAS COMING TO BRYAN

Ministers and Prominent Laymen of Texas Will Hold State Meeting Here October 10-13.

An approaching event of more than general interest in religious circles is the coming to Bryan of the Synod of Texas which will convene in the First Presbyterian church on Tuesday evening October 10th. This is the highest State Court of the Presbyterian church and represents all Presbyterian interests in the State including the Churches, Colleges, Orphanages, Seminaries and other religious activities. The membership of this court is constituted of all the ministers and one Ruling Elder from each church in the State. As there are 211 ministers and 445 churches, it has a possible membership of 656 though the average attendance is between 150 and 200. All the prominent ministers and many prominent business men from every section of the State will be in attendance. It offers therefore to the citizens of Bryan a rare opportunity to hear and know men who have been leaders in Presbyterianism and who have contributed much to the religious thought of our day. (By Associated Press.)

New London, Conn., Sept. 16.—The American members of the American-Mexican joint commission studied today subjects to be discussed when the session resumes work next week, in the absence of the Mexican members of the commission, who are in New York for the celebration of Mexican Independence Day. General Bliss, who pointed out the necessity of border protection by Mexican troops in the event the Americans are withdrawn, has been called into consultation. It is not believed, however, that early meetings of the commission will deal with this phase of the situation.
