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KYLE FIELD SCENE
OF STIFF WORKOUT

Suits Were Issued Saturday to Men Eligible for Places on A. and M. Football Squad.

Football men at the A. and M. College got their first taste of real work Saturday afternoon at Kyle Field. Suits and equipment were issued Saturday to all eligible men and Harlan and Graves put the candidates through a short but stiff workout. The call for freshmen has been issued for Wednesday and equipment will be given out to the first year men at that time.

Captain Rollins devoted much of his time Saturday to hurling the forward pass to the backs and ends. Johnson, a speedy end of the '11 squad, who was not in school last year, showed especial aptitude for receiving the pass. In the brief booting practice Tommy Cochran of Austin, Rollins and Thornton of Houston sent good spirals for forty and fifty yards. Following are positions of the players: Captain Rollins, back; Mitchell, the sensational runner who broke all records in the 100-yard dash for the South last spring, a back of much promise; Cochran, back; Frances, back; Johnson, end; Graham, end; Spencer, end; Thornton, end; Settegast, tackle; Montgomery, tackle; Edgar, Wilson and EGAR, guards; Rogers, center; Litterest, quarter.

Giffillan, Burns, Crow and Rylander are expected to report Sunday and by Monday the Aggie squad will be composed of about thirty men, every one of whom has had experience on the varsity before.

NEGRO WOMAN VIC-TIM OF KEEN KNIFE

Bessie Bell, Colored, is Killed With Pocketknife in Hands of Her Sweetheart.

Another murder was added to the list of crimes committed in Brazos county yesterday morning at 4 o'clock when Sam, alias Buster, Steptoe, killed his sweetheart, Bessie Bell, in the lower part of Brazos county near Clay Station.

There had been a negro dance in this community and the Bell woman accompanied Steptoe to the dance. After the crowd had disbanded and started home she found another man whom she liked better and told Steptoe that she was going home with him. It is alleged Steptoe then pulled out a long bladed knife and slashed the woman across the abdomen, killing her instantly. It is said the negro committing the crime had given his victim some money the early part of the night to keep for him and that this is one thing that brought about the killing.

The sheriff's department in Bryan was notified of the killing and were immediately on the trail of the murderer and just four and a half hours later Deputy Sheriff L. E. Morehead caught him in this city. He was landed behind the bars and will be given an examining trial later in the week.

IN OLD BRAZOS

Marriage License Record is Broken Saturday for Past Three Years. Nine Couples Wed.

According to the marriage license records kept by County Clerk W. S. Higgs, Cupid has been very busy the past few days. In his office Saturday Mr. Higgs was called upon to issue nine marriage licenses. This, declared Mr. Higgs, is the largest number issued in one day since Christmas eve in 1913, when he gave 18 couples their credentials to cast off "single casedness" for "double blessedness." In the list of couples that applied Saturday to get licenses there was one white couple, two Mexicans, one Italian and five negroes.

County Clerk Higgs says that he attributes this big business to the high price of cotton and the good times in general that prevail in

Brazos county. Several of the couples that were married Saturday are colored people who were imported into this county to pick cotton and they have made so much money they do not know what else to do but get married.

BIBLE CLASS AT M. E. CHURCH REORGANIZED

Annual Reorganization of Wesley Bible Class Was Had Yesterday. Prof. R. O. Allen Leader.

The annual reorganization of the Wesley Bible class at the First Methodist church was had yesterday and new officers were elected with the exception of the leader, Prof. R. O. Allen. This gentleman has been the leader of this class for a number of years and the class would under no circumstances give him up. Prof. Allen is one of the most interesting talkers in the State before a Sunday school class and this body of men and young men has made much progress under his leadership. The roll of the Wesley Bible class numbers almost one hundred and the average attendance of same is from 35 to 45 every Sunday morning.

At the last meeting of the quarterly conference held in this city a committee was appointed, with Mr. Ed Hall as chairman, to arrange plans for the enlargement of the Bible class room and also the primary department room. The class rooms are entirely too small to accommodate either department and it is realized that the enlargement is an absolute necessity.
