

ORDER OF ELECTION.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Bryan, held on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1916, Alderman Tyler Haswell offered the following resolution ordering an election for the improvement of the sewer system of the City of Bryan, and which was duly seconded by Alderman J. S. Doane, and being put to a vote of the City Council, J. S. Doane, B. U. Sims, Tyler Haswell, John C. Vick and W. S. Wilson, Jr., here voting for said order, and no votes being cast against same, and which resolution or order was duly carried, is as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Bryan deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City of Bryan that an election be held on the first Tuesday in November, A. D. 1916, same being the 7th day of November, A. D. 1916, at which election the following proposition is to be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Bryan be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00), payable in forty (40) years after date with the option of redeeming same at any time after twenty (20) years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City?

Said election shall be held at the City Hall of the City of Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, and the following persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

C. E. Jones, Presiding Judge; Mat Vitopil, Assistant Judge; Wilson Bradley and Elmer Dodson, Clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the 26th Legislature, Laws of 1899, and under such other election laws of the State of Texas that are in force governing the same, and only qualified voters who are property-tax payers of said city shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds;" and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds." Such election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Bryan, shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the Mayor is directed to cause Notice of the Election to be posted up at the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Bryan, and by publication of said notice for at least thirty (30) days prior to said date of election.

DALLAS TERMINAL OPENS WITH FAIR

Union Station Celebration Committee Has Chosen Same Date for Opening as the State Fair.

(By Associated Press.)

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 27.—The program of events that will mark the opening of the State Fair of Texas and the South's greatest union passenger terminal has been announced by the union station celebration committee, which met recently at the Chamber of Commerce and Manufacturers' Association building. It follows: Program for October 14: Municipal parade at 9 o'clock. Opening ceremonies at the union station at 11 o'clock.

Luncheon on second floor of station in honor of visiting railroad officials at 12:30 o'clock.

Opening of State Fair of Texas and dedication of Sydney Smith Memorial beginning at 2:30 o'clock.

Banquet at Scottish Rite Cathedral beginning at 8 o'clock.

All doubt as to whether trains will be using the new union station during the thirty-first annual State Fair of Texas was removed by the announcement to the committee by the Union terminal officers that the big terminal will handle the fair crowds and make possible the celebration of both events on the same day. The hour of the parade is set for 9 o'clock and it is planned to disband about 11 o'clock so that Governor Ferguson and his staff, Mayor Lindsley and the city commissioners, visiting railroad officials and others can proceed directly to the union station to open the ceremonies there. The program at the station proper will not consume more than an hour, according to the plans. There will be only a few speakers. Bishop Garrett will pronounce the invocation, to be followed by Louis Lipsitz, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who after a brief talk will introduce Governor Ferguson. Colonel Frank G. Pettibone, president of the Union Terminal Company, will officially turn over the \$50,000,000 terminals to the city of Dallas and Mayor Lindsley will acknowledge acceptance on the part of the citizens.

The luncheon in the main dining room of the station, at which 100 guests will be present, will begin promptly at 12:30 o'clock. This event will be informal. At the conclusion of the ceremonies the guests will proceed to the State Fair grounds.
