CITY ENGINEER ADAMS RETURNS

Inspection Trip Over Texas Reveals Many Interesting Facts Regarding City Government and Sewer Plants.

While away on an inspection trip studying sewage disposal and general city government I visited several towns about the size of Bryan, and must say that I found none as good. While the citizens of the towns that I did visit thought so it would only require a short visit from them to our city to disabuse their minds as to which was the best.

I found Victoria and Cuero better situated from the standpoint of beauty and good water, as the people along the West Texas rivers are blessed with an over abundance of flowing wells and cheap water.

In my inspection of the new sewage disposal plant at Houston, which is what is called an activated sludge plant and a method new to the world having only been discovered in the last few years, it developed that it was impossible for a city the size of Bryan to operate such a plant, although we have been advised previously by the State Board of Health that it was practicable. The very fact that it requires an expert chemist constantly on the job would let us out.

During my stay in Houston in addition to investigating sewage disposal I took occasion to look into the roads and streets, which information will be valuable to our city and county in future.

My next stop was at Victoria, one of the most beautifully located cities that it has ever been my pleasure to visit. Situated on the banks of the Guadalupe River, a never failing cold clear stream of water, the city itself being located on the hills adjacent, which gives them perfect drainage for their streets without any great expense for storm sewers and also a gradual fall for all of their sanitary sewers, which requires very little excavation in order to serve any part of the city, and also the bed of the river has some wonderful deposits of gravel, which has made it very cheap indeed, for the city government to gravel all their residence streets as well as the business section. However, the gravelled streets in the business section are very unsanitary and as light as it is impossible to sweep streets over this gravel, consequently there is a continual gathering of refuse matter, which is finally ground into dust and blown about the city.

The city of Victoria, a few years ago, had the same charter as we have and found that they were unable to operate under the very low rate, consequently called an election of charter commissioners, who wrote a new charter, but stuck to the Aldermanic form of government, for which a great many of the citizens are now sorry, and an acting Mayor of the city stated that the Council had made up their minds to pass an ordinance creating the office of City Manager, with the title however, of Supt. of Public Works, which would practically give them the Commission form of government.

Under their present method of governing city affairs there being no official head of the city other than the Mayor, who was a business man and very busy, it was rather trying to really ascertain the inner workings of their city management, but by interviewing various persons I finally managed to get at what I was after. The city receives its water from flowing wells situated on the banks of the Guadalupe, which takes out most of the cost of a water system. The water is then pumped into a reservoir located in the business section of the city and then distributed into the mains. On account of the abundance of water the city has been able to sell water to the resident property owners at the very small rental of sixteen dollars a year, every one being allowed all the water that they wished and while the town is very little, if any larger than Bryan, they are using one million gallons of water per day, while our average consumption is one hundred thousand gallons. However, the city administration have just recently started the installation of meters in order to test the consumption of some of the large resident property owners and found some homes using as much as thirty and forty thousand gallons per month, consequently have made up their minds to install meters to every consumer, but to sell them water at the very low rate of fifteen cents per thousand gallons.

Victoria is not so fortunate in their lighting system, having recently granted a franchise to the Southern Electric Company to deliver current from Cuero to Victoria at the rate of fifteen cents per kilowatt, the street lighting system being let out to the same parties by the city at about six hundred dollars per month, which is very much in excess of what the city of Bryan pays, being one hundred and sixty dollars per month, and they have no more lights than we have.

ORDER OF ELECTION.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Bryan, held on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1916, Alderman Tyler Haswell offered the following resolution ordering an election for the improvement of the sewer system of the City of Bryan, and which was duly seconded by Alderman J. S. Doane, and being put to a vote of the City Council, J. S. Doane, B. U. Sims, Tyler Haswell, John C. Vick and W. S. Wilson, Jr., here voting for said order, and no votes being cast against same, and which resolution or order was duly carried, is as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Bryan deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City of Bryan that an election be held on the first Tuesday in November, A. D. 1916, same being the 7th day of November, A. D. 1916, at which election the following proposition is to be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Bryan be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00), payable in forty (40) years after date with the option of redeeming same at any time for twenty (20) years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City?

Said election shall be held at the City Hall of the City of Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, and the following persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

C. E. Jones, Presiding Judge; Mat Vitopil, Assistant Judge; Wilson Bradley and Elmer Dodson, Clerks.
Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the 25th Legislature, Laws of 1899, and under such other election laws of the State of Texas that are in force governing the same, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds;" and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds." Such election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Bryan, shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the Mayor is directed to cause Notice of the Election to be posted up at the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Bryan, and by publication of said notice for at least thirty (30) days prior to said date of election.
