MUST TELL POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS

Louisville & Nashville Officials Ordered to Answer Questions of Interstate Commission.

(By Associated Press)
Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—Justice Stafford of the District of Columbia supreme court decided today that Milton Smith, president, and other officials of the Louisville & Nashville railroad must answer questions propounded by the Interstate Commerce Commission regarding political contributions. The justice held that the commission had a right to know of such contributions, not because of their political nature, but because they affect the questions of reasonableness of rates and other important questions of railroad accounting.

ORDER OF ELECTION.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Bryan, held on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1916, Alderman Tyler Haswell offered the following resolution ordering an election for the improvement of the sewer system of the City of Bryan, and which was duly seconded by Alderman J. S. Doane, and being put to a vote of the City Council, J. S. Doane, B. U. Sims, Tyler Haswell, John C. Wick and W. S. Wilson, Jr., here voting for said order, and no votes being cast against same, and which resolution or order was duly carried, is as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Bryan deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned;

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City of Bryan that an election be held on the first Tuesday in November, A. D. 1916, same being the 7th day of November, A. D. 1916, at which election the following proposition is to be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Bryan be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00), payable in forty (40) years after date with the option of redeeming same at any time after twenty (20) years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City?

Said election shall be held at the City Hall of the City of Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, and the following persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

C. E. Jones, Presiding Judge; Mat Vitopil, Assistant Judge; Wilson Bradley and Elmer Dodson, Clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the 26th Legislature, Laws of 1899, and under such other election laws of the State of Texas that are in force governing the same, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds;" and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds." Such election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Bryan, shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the Mayor is directed to cause Notice of the Election to be posted up at the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Bryan, and by publication of said notice for at least thirty (30) days prior to said date of election.

THIS MAN HAS A CHEESE FACTORY ON HIS FARM.

Farm and Fireside says: "Making cheese from the milk of a single dairy has the disadvantage of small output in most cases, but the advantage of complete control of all operations. Fred Bellke, a Wisconsin dairyman, has conducted a farm-size cheese factory for seven years in the following manner.

"He has a herd of 15 cows which produce from 250 to 300 pounds of milk a day. His building is 20 feet wide by 30 feet long, with a partition dividing it into two rooms, each 15 by 20 feet. One room is used for cheese making, and the other is his boiler and tool room. There is a door between them. His engine is a steam engine of upright pattern.

"In the cellar below the cheese-room is his curing room, and in one corner of this he has a force pump to draw water from a well ten feet from the building. The curing room also has one important feature essential for making cheese of high quality—namely, a system for securing fresh cold air. This comes through clay pipes connected with the well, and he has a pump for supplying the fresh air according to the amount needed.

"In the winter time the curing-room is heated to the proper temperature with steam heat. Mr. Bellke not only makes excellent cheese but he has been fortunate in having a steady market for his entire product. He never has made enough to satisfy the demand. Brick cheese is one of the varieties he has made to a large extent, and has secured as much as 14 pounds of brick cheese from 100 pounds of milk. The factory is equipped so that butter can also be made if desired."

YOUNG TEACH THE OLD.

Grandmothers Take Cooking Lessons From Young Girls.

Farm and Fireside, the national farm paper, says:

"A county agent walked into the office of the dean of agriculture of the University of Missouri at Columbia three years ago. He asked the dean if two teachers of home economics could be sent to Johnson county to conduct cooking and sewing schools in the county schools for six weeks. "The request was granted.

"A woman more than 80 years old and her sixteen children and grandchildren were among the students of one of the Missouri cooking and sewing schools. One woman had refused to take the teacher for an evening. Her husband was opposed to the farm bureau anyway. At the close of the session the first afternoon she went to the chairman and tried to get an evening with the teacher, saying, 'Why, she is just like the rest of us.' While in the homes these teachers, both of whom were young women just

out of college, surprised these practical folks by the many practical things they could do. In one place the hostess had some unexpected company and the teacher made the cake for her. One man said, 'Any girl that can make hot rolls like that girl, can have a home at our house as long as she wants it.'

"On these days these things were taught: Monday, bread making; Tuesday, pastry; Wednesday, cooking of meats and vegetables; Thursday, fruit and vegetables, home canning; Friday, sewing; Saturday, review on any points asked.

"One of the best results which has come from the teaching of home economics in country communities is the introduction of improved equipment in the home. Many women who had used primitive tools and utensils for years because they did not realize the saving in labor and time that up-to-date equipment would mean, have lessened their work by a third since their kitchens were furnished with a few of the new devices.

"A fireless cooker or an oil stove,

which some of the women have regarded as impractical or involving new processes that would be hard to learn, proves its practicability in an hour's demonstration and the hard-working housewife goes home with the determination to possess one."
