

### ORDER OF ELECTION.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Bryan, held on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1916, Alderman Tyler Haswell offered the following resolution ordering an election for the improvement of the sewer system of the City of Bryan, and which was duly seconded by Alderman J. S. Doane, and being put to a vote of the City Council, J. S. Doane, B. U. Sims, Tyler Haswell, John C. Vick and W. S. Wilson, Jr., here voting for said order, and no votes being cast against same, and which resolution or order was duly carried, is as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Bryan deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City of Bryan that an election be held on the first Tuesday in November, A. D. 1916, same being the 7th day of November, A. D. 1916, at which election the following proposition is to be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Bryan be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars, (\$8,000.00), payable in forty (40) years after date with the option of redeeming same at any time for twenty (20) years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City?

Said election shall be held at the City Hall of the City of Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, and the following persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

C. E. Jones, Presiding Judge; Mat Vitopil, Assistant Judge; Wilson Bradley and Elmer Dodson, Clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the 26th Legislature, Laws of 1899, and under such other election laws of the State of Texas that are in force governing the same, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds;" and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Sewer Improvement Bonds." Such election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Bryan, shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the Mayor is directed to cause Notice of the Election to be posted up at the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Bryan, and by publication of said notice for at least thirty (30) days prior to said date of election.

### NOTICE OF ELECTION.

At a special meeting of the City Council held at the City Hall in the City of Bryan on the 4th day of October, 1916, the Mayor and the following aldermen being present: Tyler Haswell, John C. Vick, J. S. Doane and B. U. Sims, the same constituting a quorum, and two-thirds of said Council, upon a motion by Alderman John C. Vick, duly seconded by J. S. Doane, same was voted "upon and unanimously carried, viz.:

"Be it ordered by the City Council of the City of Bryan, that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Bryan the following proposition: "Shall a commission be chosen to frame a new charter for the City of Bryan?"

Said proposition to be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Bryan at a special election to be held on November 7th, 1916, at the City Hall in said city, same to be governed by the general election laws in force on said date; that C. E. Jones is hereby appointed Presiding Judge, and Mat Vitopil Assistant Judge of said election, and Wilson Bradley and Elmer Dodson are hereby appointed Clerks of said election.

At said election the official ballot shall read as follows:

"For a Commission to be chosen to frame a new charter."

"Against a Commission to be chosen to frame a new charter."

Those in favor of said proposition shall have written or printed on their ballots, "For a Commission to be chosen to frame a new charter," and those opposed to the proposition shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against a Commission to be chosen to frame a new charter."

All qualified voters within the City of Bryan will be entitled to vote at this election and the polls will be opened between the hours as required by the general laws.

A copy of this order, duly signed by the Mayor and attested by the Secretary of the City of Bryan, shall constitute and be an order for said election, same to be published in The Bryan Eagle, a newspaper published in said city, for thirty days consecutively before said election.

## ARIZONA CAN HURL SHELLS 20 MILES

Big Sea Fighter Can Throw Heavier Broadside Than Three Great Battleships Combined.

(By Associated Press)

New York, Oct. 19.—The crew of the new superdreadnaught Arizona which takes her place Wednesday in the battle line of the Atlantic fleet with her sister ship, the Pennsylvania, came from the older battleships Kansas, New Hampshire and Vermont, recently transferred to the Atlantic reserve fleet at Philadelphia. An officer of the Arizona pointed out that the Arizona's 12 14-inch guns throw 6,000 pounds more in a broadside than was contained in the combined broadsides of the Kansas, Vermont and New Hampshire. The Arizona's broadside weighs about 10 tons and can be hurled about 20 miles. The other three ships combined carried 12 12-inch guns in their main batteries.

"The Arizona is too big and important to risk a chance with a green crew," said one of the Arizona's officers. "The only sensible thing to do was to give us a trained crew and the only place to get these men was out of the active fleet. As the Kansas, New Hampshire and Vermont were going into the reserve, where they belong, they furnished a majority of the men."

## SINGLE TAXERS IN SESSION AT DALLAS

J. J. Pastoriza, Tax Commissioner of Houston, to Discuss the Subject of Taxes.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 19.—The second annual Single Tax Conference, under the auspices of the Single Tax League of Texas, was opened here today for a two days' session by President Roy Bedichek of Austin. Two hundred or more delegates from Texas and Oklahoma were expected to be on hand for the conference.

Matters pertaining to the single tax method of taxation were foremost on the program, including discussions and addresses on the subject. J. J. Pastoriza, tax commissioner of Houston and widely known for his advocacy in tax reform, is treasurer of the organization and will have a prominent part on the program.

Among the matters to be discussed are the future of the tenant farmer in Texas and the increasing number of persons who do not own their homes in the cities. It was predicted by some of the delegates that within a few years the advocates of single tax, action would have resolved themselves into a strong political factor.

## FERGUSON SUES MORRIS FOR \$50,000

Action in Austin County Was Result of Recent Primary and State-Mentions Made.

Brenham, Texas, Oct. 19.—Governor James E. Ferguson asks for damages in the sum of \$50,000 in a suit filed in Austin county Tuesday against Charles H. Morris, opposing candidate for governor at the last primary election. In the petition it is alleged that libelous articles appeared in various newspapers over the signature of Morris, and the petition is similar to that filed recently in Washington county, wherein the Temple Telegram and C. H. Maedgen are the defendants. The damages asked by the governor

from the Temple Telegram et al and Morris aggregate \$100,000. The suit against Morris will be tried at the next term of the Austin county district court, which convenes in January, and the suit against the Temple Telegram will be tried in Brenham, where the next term of district court meets in March, 1917. In both suits the governor will be represented by Mathis, Teague, Embrey & Mathis of Brenham and Judge C. G. Krueger of Bellville. Both suits are the result of advertisements appearing in various newspapers, signed by the governor's opponent, in which slanderous attacks on the governor's integrity are alleged to have been made. The alleged statements were published immediately preceding the primary election and were signed by a number of men.

## U. S. WARNED TURKS MAY BOMBARD SHIPS

Ottoman Government Said Neutral Vessels Passing Guarded Coast May Become Targets.
