NATIVES AND ALLIES IN OPEN HOSTILITIES

Conditions in Athens, Greece Are of the Rioting, Turbulent Kind and the Greek Reserves Have Taken the Law into Their Own Hands—Conditions May Lead to Open Hostilities Between Allies and Greeks—No Change of Consequence on any of the Battle Fronts—Germans Claim to Have Captured Many Russians in Galicia.

PRESIDENT WILSON ESCAPED ASSASSINATION

Crank Jumped on Running Board of Car Carrying Bag Which Contained Ugly Knife and Bottle of Liquid—Did Not Like Presidents' European War Policy.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 20.—While on an automobile tour of the city, a man, apparently a workman with a bag of tools, jumped on the running board of President Wilson's conveyance. He rode for a block before he was arrested by local detectives.

The prisoner gave his name as Richard Colton, a machinist, who said he was not satisfied with President Wilson's conduct in the European war.

In the bag he carried a knife with a blade five inches long and a bottle of liquid, which the police are endeavoring to analyze.

AERO SQUADRONS ADDED TO ARMY

War Department Authorizes Complete Equipment for two Additional Squadrons to Regular Army.

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, Oct. 20.—Authorization was given today for the complete equipment of two additional aero squadrons for the regular army. When the material, costing about \$800,000 for each squadron has been delivered in San Antonio the regular army flying service will have been tripled. Orders for the enlistment of 13,000 men for new squadrons have gone out and the selection of officers is being considered.

PRESIDENT AND MR. BRYAN MEET

Former Secretary of State and Nation's Chief Executive Meet for First Time in Months.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 20.—President Wilson and W. J. Bryan, former secretary of state, met here today for the first time in many months. The President was en route to Shadow Lawn from Chicago, where he had an engagement yesterday, and Mr. Bryan is here to speak in the interest of President Wilson's candidacy.

DIES AS RESULT OF INJURIES.

Rosenberg Man, Struck by Automobile, Unable to Survive.

Houston, Tex., Oct. 20.—While being brought to Houston for medical attention following an automobile accident in Rosenberg Thursday afternoon, Dee Hopkins died. He was struck by an automobile that had been forced from its path to avoid striking a wagon. The body will be forwarded to Rosenberg.

Villa Forces Sack San Andres

Chihuahua City, Mex., Oct. 20.—Francisco Villa and a part of his bandit command took possession of the mining town of San Andres, 25 miles west of here, Thursday.

London, Oct. 20.—Extremely turbulent conditions in Athens Wednesday night were reported in a Reuters dispatch. Greek reservists have taken the law into their own hands despite the presence of a strong entente detachment of marines who are being given virtually no assistance by the Greek authorities in maintaining order, the dispatch declares.

Serbian Victory Reported.

Paris, Oct. 20.—The Paris war office today announced the Serbians had captured the plateau and village of Veleyselo on the western end of the Macedonian front, putting the Bulgarians to rout. The Bulgarian statement today merely says, "Heavy fighting is in progress on the Cerna front."

Two Lost on Alaunia.

New York, Oct. 20.—The Cunard line announces all but two of the crew of the Alaunia, which was sunk by a mine yesterday, had been saved. The passengers were previously landed at Falmouth.

London, Oct. 20.—The German statement of fighting in Macedonia says the forward movement of the Serbians in the bend of the Cerna river has been halted by the troops of the Central powers after temporary Serbian successes.

Another Berlin communication tells of the capture of more than two thousand Russians in the Galician fighting, where the Russian positions on the west bank of the River Narayuvka were stormed.

On the western front fighting Berlin claims that the greater part of the trenches on the road between Eau court, Labbaye and Lebarque, which were captured by the British October 18th, have been retaken.

"In the last great attack against the German positions," the statement continues, "the British used several tanks and three of them were destroyed by German artillery fire."

Teutons on Offensive.

Bucharest, Oct. 20.—(Bulletin)—The Bulgarians and Germans in Dobrudja have taken the offensive along the entire front. They have forced back the Rumanian left wing, the war office announces. The Rumanians have taken the offensive in the Oltuz valley, where the Austro-Hungarians invaded Rumania, but have driven back the invaders to the frontier.

CITY COUNCIL IN SPECIAL MEETING

Completed Pavement Work Accepted and Routine Matters Occupy Time of City Dads.

A meeting, not regular and not called, but just a meeting, of the city council of the city of Bryan was held last night in the council chamber at the city hall with Mayor W. W. Harris presiding.

The paving which has been completed on West Anderson street and the short streets which intersect this street, by the Kaw Paving Company, was accepted and certificates issued in favor of the paving people against the property owners.

A resolution was passed requiring the I. and G. N. Railroad Company to gravel Bryan avenue from the north line of 24th or Caldwell street north to the oil mill.

Considerable discussion was had regarding the water situation. Mr. Jordan T. Lawler of the H. T. Lawler & Sons Company was present and announced that he was using every effort to improve the water situation in Bryan. He surprised the council when he made the announcement that the water from the mineral well, or the undesirable well, had not been used since Monday. He further stated that he was of the opinion that the city could get along without using this water any more until next fall. He also stated that he was in the next few days going to test out the Nail well, across the track from the power plant, the one that was dug some time ago for gas. Mr. Lawler is of the opinion that good water can be produced from this well and without one cent of cost to the city he is going to make the investigation.

The regular routine matters were brought before the council, and after disposition was made of them, the meeting adjourned subject to call by the mayor.

Dry Goods Firm of Maloney & Co. Suffers Loss of Much Desirable Merchandise Last Night.

Some one, and everybody is wondering who, decided last night they needed some merchandise, and you can just believe what we are going to tell you, they got it. In the wee sma' hours of the morning, while the cold north wind was blowing across the plains, an hour when no one works but the night cook and the hotel porter, some one, or possibly several, forced an entrance through the back door of the dry goods store of Maloney & Co., on North Main street, and proceeded to help themselves. It would be a hard matter to tell just what the thieves carried off, but according to the manager, Mr. W. S. Wilson, Jr., of this firm, the burglars were evidently trying to please the feminine sex. Nothing in the store except ladies' wearables could be missed. An estimate, after a good close survey by Mr. Wilson and his efficient force of helpers, was made at from \$250 to \$400. Every silk waist, every pair of silk hose of all sizes, every good ladies' cloak and skirt, silk goods by the bolt, lingerees, messaline and practically all the other choice stuff carried by this popular firm was taken out. Not in every instance did the burglar take all of a variety, but he got the best there was.

Money Taken.

After checking up, Mr. Wilson left \$25.00 in the cash register for change and Mr. Culprit did not overlook this—just appropriated it for instance.

Entrance at Rear.

The plate glass door at the rear of the building was broken out with some instrument, and with this done, the Yale lock on the door was tripped and the door thrown open.

Goods Packed in Grips.
