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PERSHING'S MEN SAID TO BE ON MOVE NORTHWARD

INFANTRY MAKING USE OF MOTOR TRUCKS.

First Movement Was From El Valle to Colona Dublin—Cavalry Accompanying the Column.

(By Associated Press.)

Juarez, Mexico, Jan. 23.—American troops of the punitive expedition were marching from El Valle to Colona Dublin Monday, according to a message received from Casas Grandes at 2 o'clock Monday. These troops were expected to reach Colona Dublin by night, where they will go into camp for a rest before proceeding toward the border, the message added. This message also stated that a force of American troops left Colona Dublin early Monday, proceeding north on the communication line to establish a temporary field base for the expedition when it starts on its march to the border at Columbus, N. M. This march was believed here to have been the first move of the punitive expedition toward the border from the field headquarters.

The El Valle troops, numbering approximately 2,500 men, started moving at dawn Sunday morning, according to the message received here from Casas Grandes Monday.

Ninety motor trucks which passed Casas Grande Friday for El Valle were reported to have been loaded with infantry troops and to have been started toward Colona Dublin with the cavalry troops guarding them, according to this same reliable source.

Food supplies for the soldiers and feed for the cavalry horses were sent north from field headquarters at Colona Dublin early Monday morning, according to the messages which have been received from Casas Grandes. These supplies will be left at the temporary field base somewhere north of Colona Dublin for the use of the men and horses when they start northward from field headquarters.

The El Valle garrison, it was reported here, would proceed north toward the border Tuesday after resting in Colona Dublin Monday night. They were in heavy marching order and will probably lead General Pershing's column to the border.

ILLINOIS PROS. TO USE W. J. BRYAN

Arrangements Made to Have Great Commoner Help in Prohibition Fight in That State.

(By Associated Press.) Springfield, Ill., Jan. 23.—Illinois dry leaders perfected arrangements Monday night for the appearance here Tuesday of William Jennings Bryan, whose coming will be simultaneous with the introduction of a statewide prohibition bill in the legislature.

Bryan will arrive here at 2 p. m. on a special train. Aboard the train will be several hundred Chicago Democrats who will escort Mr. Bryan to Springfield.

Bryan plans two addresses here, one under the auspices of the Illinois Democrats in the afternoon and the other under the auspices of the Springfield local option committee at 8 p. m.

COUNTY COURT.

GALVESTON TO GET NAVAL VESSELS

Will Be Sent by Navy Department as Attractions for the Mardi Gras February 19 and 20.

Galveston, Texas, Jan. 23.—In a letter received by the Galveston Commercial Association Monday, Secretary of the Navy Daniels says that arrangements are being made to assign a naval vessel or vessels to Galveston during the forthcoming Mardi Gras celebration February 19 and 20.

Secretary Daniels says the vessels will be sent to Galveston for this occasion unless some unexpected contingency should arise.

It is also hoped that the battleship Missouri, which has been assigned to Galveston for the use of the Texas naval militia, will reach her new post in time for the celebration. There is, however, no definite information as to when the Missouri will arrive.

NO LONGER DOUBT ABOUT PERSHING

Order Issued for the Initial Movements in Withdrawal of U. S. Punitive Force.

STOCK EXCHANGE WILL NOT BE INVESTIGATED

DECLARATION OF ATTORNEY IN LEAK PROBE

Probe Will Concern Only Events Surrounding the Leak in Regard to President's Peace Note.

New York, Jan. 23.—Sherman Whipple, new counsel in the "leak inquiry" today began the New York end of the investigation by announcing that a general investigation of the stock exchange is not intended. It is only expected to deal with events surrounding the "leak" on the President's peace note.

H. G. S. Noble, president of the stock exchange, was the first witness. He described the workings of the exchange.

After President Noble had concluded, the committee ordered him to request members of the exchange to submit a list of all their transactions between December 10th and 23rd.

RIVERS RISING TO THE FLOOD STAGE

Melting Snows and Rains Send Ohio on the Rampage—Damage to Property Heavy.

(By Associated Press.) Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 23.—Heavy rains and melting snows over the watersheds of the Monongahela and Allegheny rivers all of Sunday and Sunday night prompted the weather department to announce Monday morning that the Ohio river probably would reach flood stage—22.5 feet—here. Both the Allegheny and the Monongahela were reported rising at observation points.

Rivers continued to rise throughout the night in Northern West Virginia following a heavy downpour of rain on top of a 3-inch snow, and reports indicated a heavy property damage. Street car traffic between Fairmont and Mannington has been suspended, while parts of the latter place have been flooded. The lower section of Weston has also been inundated.

Reports from Elkins said flood conditions were expected to be reached later in the day.

COUNTRY CLUB NOTES.

Will Have Golf Club and Have Employed Golf Instructor.

The Country Club has engaged the services of Mr. S. J. Cooper of Traverse, Mich., to give instructions in golf to its members. Mr. Cooper will arrive in a few days and he will also superintend the immediate construction of a golf course. Mr. Cooper has the distinction of being the state open champion of Indiana.

The club owns 100 acres of land, part of which will be covered by a 30-acre lake, which has just been completed, and when filled with water will be the largest body of water in the county. It is the intention of the club to complete some time this year its new \$10,000 club house.

BILL TO AVOID THE RUN-OFF PRIMARY

OFFERED IN SENATE BY SENATOR DAYTON.

Preferential Primary Would Apply to City, County, State and National Elections.

(By Associated Press.)

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—Senator Dayton today introduced a preferential primary bill, applying to city, county, state and national elections. Its purpose is to avoid the possibility of second primaries.

Would Return Troops.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—A concurrent resolution, asking the Washington authorities to return to their homes state troops now on the border, was introduced by Senator Harley today, and referred to the senate federal relations committee.

Branch A. and M. Hearing.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—The senate committee on education today set Friday as a date for an open session for the consideration of the three bills providing for the establishment of branches of A. and M. College in East Texas, West Texas and the Panhandle.

Public Utilities Commission.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—Senator Lattimore today introduced a bill providing for a public utilities commission of five members, to have jurisdiction over gas, electric light, telegraph, telephone and other public corporations. It provides for \$6,000 salary for each member.

To Regulate Child Labor.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—The senate labor committee today reported favorably a bill prohibiting the working of children of 12, 15 and 17 years in certain occupations.

To Raise Governor's Salary.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—A resolution to amend the constitution and give the governor a salary of \$10,000 instead of \$4,000, was introduced today by Senators Johnson and Hall.

No Common Law Marriages.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—By a vote of 14 to 12 the senate today killed the Esterbrook bill prohibiting common law marriages.

REPORTED SUSPICIOUS STEAMER

Steamer Marina Reports a Vessel Which May Have Been a German Raider.

WOMEN ARE TO WEAR OVERALLS

Chicago Department Store Purchased Large Stock—Ideas Borrowed From England.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 23.—A leading department store today announced the purchase of a large stock of overalls for women, which are expected to be generally worn this summer, not only by shop workers, but by housekeepers. The garments are advertised as "cooler than skirts." The idea is borrowed from abroad, where women munition workers wear trousers.

CITY SHAKEN BY METEOR.
