





## NOT YET OFF FOR PORTO RICO.

Sampson Still Holding General  
Miles' Expedition at  
Guantanamo.

## GARCIA AND HIS CUBAN SOLDIERS.

It Is Said He Is Still Going to  
Fight the Spaniards at Hol-  
guin and Manzanillo.

## MORE RUMORS OF PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

They Are Said to Have Originated  
From Gamazo, but Are Denied  
From Various Sources—Hob-  
son Reaches New York.

Washington, July 22.—The war de-  
partment has received a telegram from  
General Miles showing that on Thurs-  
day at 7 p. m., he was still at Guanta-  
namo. The following troops are with him  
aboard transports in Guantanamo har-  
bor, en route to Porto Rico: Four light  
batteries and Third and Fourth artil-  
lery; Lomie's battery B., Fifth artillery;  
Sixth Illinois, Sixth Massachusetts, 375  
recruits for the Fifth corps, 60 men of  
the signal corps and the Seventh hos-  
pital corps, making 3415 men all told.

## MILITARY GOVERNOR OF SANTIAGO DE CUBA.

Brigadier General Wood of the Rough  
Riders Appointed in Place of  
General McKibbin.

Santiago, July 22.—Brigadier General  
Wood of the rough riders has been ap-  
pointed military governor of Santiago,  
to succeed General McKibbin, who re-  
turns to his old duty.

The French cruiser Rignault de Gen-  
ouilly has arrived with supplies for the

relief of the French citizens at Santiago.  
A large exodus of Cubans are expected  
during the next few days, they will re-  
turn to the cultivation of the country,  
that work being the chief source of  
wealth of the island. A greater part of  
Garcia's army leave here going in the  
direction of Manzanillo.

## TALK OF PEACE AGAIN REVIVED.

Senor Gamazo Says Peace Honorable to  
Spain Will Shortly Be Concluded  
and the War Ended.

Madrid, July 22.—Minister of public  
Instructions Senor Gamazo, is author-  
ity for the statement that peace hono-  
rable to the Spanish army will shortly  
be concluded.

## NO POWER DARES TO INTERFERE.

Unless Asked by Both Belligerents  
There Is No Way to Start Nego-  
tiations For Peace.

London, July 22.—A prominent offi-  
cial of the British foreign office said at  
1 o'clock this afternoon:

"We have nothing confirmatory of  
Gamazo's statement. We wish it were  
true, but as far as we are advised the  
signs don't seem propitious of early  
peace. Connected with the future of  
peace negotiation absolutely nothing has  
occurred thus far upon which to base the  
idea. As a general principle in these af-  
fairs the interference of a neutral power  
is a mistake unless invited by both bel-  
ligerents. It is known Spanish ambas-

sadors have been sounding other ambas-  
sadors of the courts of Europe with the object  
of inducing the concerted representa-  
tions at Washington to stop the war and  
there is reason to believe that Great  
Britain is no longer alone in demurring  
at this and pointing out the uselessness  
of such a course. Spain knows the ir-  
reducible minimum through which the  
United States will discuss peace. What  
is she waiting for? Spain seems to for-  
get that the United States can stop the  
war at any moment she likes. Now  
that she has no Spanish fleet to reckon  
with, she can take Porto Rico and the  
Canary islands at her leisure, and finally  
deal with Cuba in cool weather. Then  
Spain will consider American  
terms less ridiculous than now."

## Another Rumor of Peace.

Paris, July 22.—The Matin publishes  
a paragraph saying that while nothing  
is definitely known, it is rumored  
that Senor Leon y Castillo, the Spanish  
ambassador at Paris, has been instruct-  
ed to approach General Horace Porter,  
United States ambassador to France,  
with a view of opening secret peace ne-  
gotiations.

## General Porter Receives News.

Paris, July 22.—General Porter, the  
American Ambassador, said to a rep-  
resentative of the Associated Press:  
"You can deny in the most emphatic  
manner that no peace negotiations have  
been opened up the present moment. I  
cannot conceive what originated the  
Matin's statement."

## War Department Not Informed.

Washington, July 22.—The war de-  
partment is still in official ignorance of  
reported retirement of Garcia with his  
army from the American lines at Santi-  
ago, and resignation of that general. It  
is considered a little singular that  
General Shafter has not made a report  
to the department of the case by tele-  
graph, but he has so far shown little dis-  
position to acquaint the department  
with the state of affairs at Santiago un-  
less called upon by the secretary of war.

## No Peace Discussion.

Washington, July 22.—The cabinet  
session was devoted exclusively to the  
Porto Rican expedition. After the ses-  
sion it was specifically and positively  
stated there had been no discussion as to  
peace outlook.

## Nothing Known at London.

London, July 22.—Inquiries in official  
circles here fail to confirm the statement  
that a Spanish minister had telegraphed  
from Madrid to the effect that peace  
will shortly be concluded.

## BLANCO'S REASONS FOR SANTIAGO'S DEFEAT.

He Says the Scarcity of Ammunition  
and Victuals is the Principal  
Reason For Defeat.

Havana, July 22.—General Blanco  
has issued the following proclamation  
announcing the capitulation of Santiago.

"After three months of heroic defense  
and many bloody combats, owing to the  
scarcity of ammunition and victuals, the  
garrison at Santiago was forced to ca-  
pitulate under honorable conditions  
with all honors of war. This occurred  
on July 16, when it was recognized by  
the Spanish general, acting commander  
of the place, that resistance was useless  
and that he could no longer hold the  
place. Notwithstanding that reinforce-  
ments had been possible.

"The occupation of Santiago by the  
military forces of the Americans are  
lacking in strategic importance owing  
to the fact that the city previously had  
been closely blockaded for a long time  
by American ships and will have little  
or no effect on the future developments  
of the Spanish campaign which is to de-  
cide Spain's fate.

"The Spanish army is intact and eager  
for glory. It is willing to measure arms  
with the Americans and in this army  
the king of Spain, the Spanish govern-  
ment and the whole country places the  
trust of defense at any cost of the integ-  
rity of Spain, with territory and honor  
of Spain's immaculate flag. This army  
is sure to be triumphant and victorious  
at last in spite of the many dangers and  
impediments, and that it will show once  
more the indomitable Spanish character  
and the well known military talents of  
our people is the hope and expectation of  
your general-in-chief."

## INSURGENTS ARE MAKING HEADWAY.

They Have Reached the Walls of Ma-  
lalte and Are Bombarding the  
Fort at That Place.

Manila, July 19.—The insurgents are  
gradually getting their artillery into  
action against Pando, Santa Mesa and  
Malalte. The fighting is desultory. The  
Spaniards have been driven from the  
trenches outside of Malalte and the in-  
surgents are strongly entrenched near  
the walls of the forts. The insurgents  
have begun to bombard the Malalte forts.
