ROOSEVELT GETS THE NOMINATION.

Defeats Governor Black at the Republican Convention on the First Ballot.

HIS NOMINATION MADE UNANIMOUS.

Chauncey Depew Made the Nominating Speech in Behalf of Col. Roosevelt.

FULL TICKET THAT WAS NOMINATED.

There Was no Clash in the Convention and the Entire Slate Made by the Roosevelt Men Was Accepted by the Convention.

Saratoga, Sept. 28.—Theodore Roosevelt was nominated as a candidate for governor of New York at the Republican state convention here on the first ballot over Governor Black and then his nomination was made unanimous.

At precisely 12:25 o'clock Chairman Odell rapped for order and Rev. Dr. Johnson of Saratoga offered prayer.

Congressman Soren E. Payne was chosen temporary chairman and escorted to the platform. He addressed the convention.

The mention of President McKinley's name was the signal for wild continuous cheering and Delegate Charles R. Moore

of Brooklyn capped the climax by asking for three cheers, which were given with a will.

Permanent organization was effected with Senator Horace White of Syracuse as chairman.

The committee on credentials reported no contest. Senator White on taking the chair addressed the convention.

The report of the committee on resolutions was not ready and the convention decided to proceed with the nominations. J. Ryer Cady, who nominated Governor Black, was frequently interrupted with applause, his closing remark about Governor Black's faithfulness to the ticket calling forth the enthusiasm of the audience.

At 4:55 o'clock Chauncey M. Depew took the platform to nominate Theodore Roosevelt. For some minutes Dr. Depew could not begin his speech for the applause that ensued.

Comptroller—Wm. J. Morgan.

Secretary of state—John T. McDonough.

Treasury—John B. Jasekal.

State engineer—Edward A. Bond.

Oregon and Iowa to Sail.

New York, Sept. 28.—The battleships Oregon, Captain A. S. Barker, and the Iowa, Captain Silas Terry, will sail at 8 o'clock this morning for Manila. It is expected that it will take the battleships 60 days to complete the journey. They will stop at Bahia, Brazil for coal.

The cruiser Buffalo, accompanied by two store ships, the Iris and the Celtic, is expected to follow the Oregon and Iowa in about a week.

Boating to Recover Bonds.

New York, Sept. 28.—Annie E. Marks of Ocean Springs, Miss., has brought suit in the United States court to recover \$50,000 worth of bonds from Price, McCormick & Co., bankers here. The bankers claim the bonds were given them by the woman's husband as collateral to insure them from loss.

Mrs. Belmont Dead.

New York, Sept. 28.—A private dispatch from Paris announces the death there of Mrs. August Belmont. Mrs. Belmont went abroad in poor health, accompanied by her husband and son, about two months ago, and was unable to leave with them when they returned several weeks ago.

Attempt at Assassination.

Taylor, Tex., Sept. 28.—An attempt was made to assassinate William Zimmerman, a German farmer living near town by striking him on the head with a weapon of some kind while he was sitting in a chair on his gallery. The wound is very severe, but will not prove fatal. No clue as to who committed the deed.

FOREST FIRES IN COLORADO.

Many Fires Have Burned About Glenwood Springs the Last Few Days, Doing Much Damage.

Glenwood Springs, Colo., Sept. 28.—This place is now the center of huge forest fires. Since Monday morning new fires have developed in every timbered section that is below the timber line. The town is in no danger, but serious loss will result in several of the valleys. The nearest fire is on Four Mile creek, and each side of the mountains are a mass of flames. Cardiff is in direct line and the streets are filled with cinders. The sun at times is nearly obscured by the smoke and looks like a huge ball of fire. The odor of the burning timber is very noticeable.

The plateaus and parks are so dry that the sage brush and grass burn like a prairie fire. Hunters are returning from the White River country on account of the fires that are prevailing there. On the east, Fulford is in serious danger and the fires are burning fiercely for over 30 miles in width.

From Lookout mountain, just east of the town, a circle of the fire and smoke can be seen. A courier just in from the Cattle Creek country says that the fire is still confined to the timber lines, and it is hoped the valleys will not be burned before a rain comes.

POWDER EXPLOSION WRECKS A BUILDING.

Three Women Jump From the Third Story to the Street, and Are Badly Injured.

St. Louis, Sept. 28.—An explosion of powder in the basement of the 4-story building occupied by C. & W. McClain, dealers in fishing tackle and sporting goods, blew out the front of the structure this morning and set the building on fire.

Three women jumped from the third floor and are dying. They were badly cut and burned in addition to being badly hurt by falling on the pavement.

Fireman Bohly was cut about the head by falling glass.

The explosion shattered all the plate glass windows in stores near by.

Within a few minutes after the explosion occurred the whole building was in flames, which communicated to the buildings on the south and occupied by the St. Louis Crockery company.

The loss on the building occupied by McClain will be total.

It is thought there are others in the building who failed to get out.

THE ADMIRAL SAMPSON HAS BEEN LAUNCHED.

It is the Second of the Four Vessels Being Built That Will Be Named For American Admirals.

Philadelphia, Sept. 28.—The steamship Admiral Sampson, now under construction for the American Mail Steamship company has been launched at Cramps ship yard, Miss Nannie Sampson, daughter of Admiral Sampson, named the new ship, assisted by Miss Margaret Smith and Miss Madeline Smith, daughters of the president of the steamship company. The first of the four vessels contracted for, the Admiral Dewey was launched a few weeks ago, and in about a week the Admiral Schley will glide into the water. The name has not yet been selected for the fourth ship.

The first vessels of their class built with special reference to serve as auxiliary naval force. The American Mail Steamship company is under contract to carry the United States mails to the British West Indies while it is proposed in addition to furnish a bi-weekly service between Santiago and Philadelphia. The service is to begin in October.

Victims of the Wreck.

Corpuscular, Tex., Sept. 28.—The victims of the Central wreck in Chambers creek bottom are getting along nicely, much better than it was expected they would. Judge Davis of Oak Cliff, who was the most seriously hurt has rallied and it is hoped he will yet recover, though the chances against it are great.

A. B. Yantis, of Robey, is resting easier, but is still in a critical condition. Senator James E. Yantis, came over from Waco to look after him.

John Richards of Richland is resting easy, and his prospects are much better.

New York Democratic Convention.

Syracuse, Sept. 28.—The Democratic state convention met here at noon today, absolutely without slate or program other than temporary organization agreed upon by the state committee. It many respects it is the most remarkable political convention ever held. The convention after temporary organization, adjourned to 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Unconscious About the Senator.

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—The non-arrival of the transport Senator is beginning to cause a little uneasiness. She is now out 35 days from Manila. The steamer Zealandia, which left Manila two days after the Senator, was caught in a typhoon and had to put into Nagasaki on Aug. 30, for repairs.

Hayard Still Alive.

Dedham, Sept. 28.—Hon. Thomas F. Bayard was still alive this morning, although in such weakened state that it seemed impossible that one breath could follow another.
