Surprise Indicated in Nebraska.

Lincoln, Nov. 9.—Scattering precinct returns indicate a political surprise in Nebraska, inasmuch as they forecast the almost certain election of Hayward, Republican, for governor, by a plurality of not less than 2000. This will be a reversal of the verdict of 1896 by nearly 15,000.

The count thus far is not enough to indicate the complexion of the legislature.

Wolcott Re-elected.

Boston, Nov. 9.—After a canvass without state issues and confined almost entirely to four congressional districts and a few local districts, the Republicans have again carried Massachusetts and Wolcott for governor for a fourth time as well as the state ticket by safe majorities. Governor Wolcott's plurality over Bruce, his Democratic opponent, will be about 70,000, or 15,000 less than his lead last year. The vote

this year was much heavier than in 1897 and Mr. Bruce made substantial gains over Williams the Democratic candidate last year.

As in the past two years Wolcott succeeded in carrying Boston, which is usually a Democratic city.

Democratic Sweep.

New Orleans, Nov. 9.—The Democrats made a clean sweep, electing six congressmen, three railway commissioners and three judges of the parish of New Orleans.

Virginia Democratic.

Richmond, Nov. 9.—A solid Democratic congressional delegation elected from Virginia.

Both Claim Indiana.

Indianapolis, Nov. 9.—About one-sixth only of the state has been heard from. Both parties claim the legislature and a majority of congressmen. Nothing decisive is known.

Both Claim Kansas.

Topeka, Nov. 9.—At midnight Chairman Albright of the Republican state committee claimed the state for Stanley, Republican, for governor by 5000, and Chairman Heddlie of the fusion claims the state for Leedy, fusion, by 11,000.

Nebraska Republican.

Omaha, Nov. 9.—Everything points to McMullin, Republican, as elected, as well as the Republican legislative ticket.

Fusion Wins in Colorado.

Denver, Nov. 9.—But meager returns have been received, but they are sufficient to show that the triple fusion of Democrats, Populists and silver Republicans has won.

Arkansas Returns.

Little Rock, Nov. 9.—The congressional election in Arkansas resulted Democratic.

South Dakota in Doubt.

Sioux Falls, Nov. 9.—Returns from the state are meager. The Republicans and Populists claim the state.

Missouri Returns Slow.

St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Returns from both the city of St. Louis and the state of Missouri are far from complete. The Democrats will make some congressional gains.

Jeans Not in It.

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.—Incomplete returns from the state give William A. Stone, Republican, a plurality of nearly 150,000 for governor over George A. Jenks, Democrat.

Republicans Hold Delaware.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 9.—Partial returns received indicate that the Republicans have elected their state, congressional and legislative tickets.

Slight Republican Gain.

Forgo, N. D., Nov. 9.—Reports are meager, but indicate a slight Republican gain.

Alabama Returns.

Birmingham, Nov. 9.—A solid Democratic congressional delegation was elected from Alabama. The only two districts in which there were contests were the Fourth and Seventh, now represented by Aldrich, Republican, and Howard, Populist, the latter noted as the author of "If Christ Came to Congress." Robbins, Democrat, defeated Aldrich and Burnett, Democrat, carried the Seventh district.

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tions are that the Republican plurality will be near 15,000. It may vary 2000 either way from that estimate. Returns indicate that the Republicans have won in all the congressional districts except the Second, Third, Fourth and Twelfth. From returns at hand it would appear that the Republicans have a majority in both branches of the legislature and a majority on joint ballot of about 16.

Result in Tennessee.

Nashville, Nov. 9.—The majority of McMullin, Democrat, for governor over Fowler, Republican, is estimated at from 10,000 to 20,000. The Democrats have a majority in the legislature. The Republicans have carried the First and Second congressional districts, the other eight giving Democratic majorities.

Nebraska Republican.

Lincoln, Nov. 9.—Related precinct returns continue to indicate that Nebraska has turned a political summer-land and landed in the Republican column. The Republicans carry the legislature and elect the governor.

Kentucky Democrats Make a Sweep.

Louisville, Nov. 9.—The democrats in Kentucky won a sweeping victory by electing 9; and possibly 10 congressmen out of eleven. Democratic congressmen have been elected in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Tenth districts and while the race is close in the Ninth, it looks like Williams, Democrat, has won. This is a certain gain of two congressmen with a possible gain of three.

Vote in Massachusetts.

Boston, Nov. 9.—With only two small towns to hear from, Bruce, Democrat, for governor, has 107,595, and Wolcott, Republican, 100,308.

South Dakota in Dispute.

Sioux Falls, Nov. 9.—The fusionists claim the state, but it is almost certain the Republicans have carried their entire state and congressional ticket.

Democrats Safe in Missouri.

St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Returns from all over Missouri are coming very slowly, though far from complete; everything received points to the election of the entire Democratic state ticket by 30,000 majority, and the election of a majority of the members of the legislature, insuring the election of United States Senator Cockrell. Three Republican congressmen of St. Louis have been re-elected, but it is expected all congressional districts outside of the city will be represented by Democrats, though final returns may change this somewhat.

In St. Louis the Republicans elected their city ticket by majorities ranging from 4000 to 7000.

Small Majority for Republicans.

Carson, Nev., Nov. 9.—The election resulted in the election of McMullin, Republican, for governor, over Sadler, Democrat, by a small majority.

Frank G. Newlands, silver, re-elected to congress. The legislature it is believed, will be favorable to reelection of Senator Stewart.

Result Not Changed.

Columbus, Nov. 9.—Additional returns do not materially change the result announced that the Republicans will have over 60,000 plurality on the state ticket. Fifteen Republicans and six Democratic congressmen.

Utah in Democratic Column.

Salt Lake, Nov. 9.—Democrats elected Roberts to congress and carried the legislature, which will elect United States senator.

Democrats Carry Montana.

Helena, Nov. 9.—Cambell, Democrat, elected to congress. The legislature is Democratic.

Result in West Virginia.

Charleston, Nov. 9.—The election of Johnston, Democrat, to congress in the Third district is conceded. The vote on joint ballot is still in doubt.

Quay's Successor.

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.—The next Pennsylvania legislature, which meets in Jan. which will elect the successor of United States Senator Quay, consists of 24 members on joint ballot, 128 votes being necessary for senator. The friends of Senator Quay claim they have 110 votes on joint ballot for Quay, three more than is necessary to elect. Anti-Quay people dispute these figures.

Ordered to San Antonio.

Washington, Nov. 9.—The Sixth infantry which has been at Fort Thomas, Ky., has been ordered to San Antonio, Tex., and upon arriving there will be distributed as follows: Headquarters, Lieutenant Colonel and band, companies E, F, G, H, I, K, L and M to Fort Sam Houston; company A to Fort McIntosh; company H to Fort Bliss; company C to Fort Ringgold; company D to Fort Brown, all in Texas.

Druggists Indicted.
