They Fired Upon Spanish Soldiers While They Were Asleep in Hotel Roma.  
**A GENERAL ROW THEN TOOK PLACE.**  
**One Cuban Was Fatally Hurt, Two Others Badly Injured and a Spanish Soldier Stabbed in the Fight.**  
Havana, Dec. 26.—Christmas day was ushered in Havana by the cracking of revolvers and rattling volleys from Mauser rifles in an affray which occurred near the center of the city between the Spanish troops garrisoning the city and the Cuban residents.  
One Cuban was fatally wounded, two others were badly injured and one Spanish soldier stabbed. A Cuban negro who received three wounds made by Mauser bullets and a bayonet cut across his forehead and who was taken to the emergency hospital, is reported to be dying.  
The affair was brought on by the Cubans who fired from a roof on the soldier asleep in the Hotel Roma. The soldiers sprang to their feet and at once returned the fire. A company of infantry sealed the low wall on one side of the building and hunted over the rooftops for the individual who had begun the firing. They found a negro badly wounded and carried him down. Other injured men were carried away by their friends.  
The volleying of the Mausers caused great alarm among the Americans, many fearing that fighting would become general through the city.

Havana, Dec. 26.—Christmas day was ushered in Havana by the cracking of revolvers and rattling volleys from Mauser rifles in an affray which occurred near the center of the city between the Spanish troops garrisoning the city and the Cuban residents.  
One Cuban was fatally wounded, two others were badly injured and one Spanish soldier stabbed. A Cuban negro who received three wounds made by Mauser bullets and a bayonet cut across his forehead and who was taken to the emergency hospital, is reported to be dying.  
The affair was brought on by the Cubans who fired from a roof on the soldier asleep in the Hotel Roma. The soldiers sprang to their feet and at once returned the fire. A company of infantry sealed the low wall on one side of the building and hunted over the rooftops for the individual who had begun the firing. They found a negro badly wounded and carried him down. Other injured men were carried away by their friends.  
The volleying of the Mausers caused great alarm among the Americans, many fearing that fighting would become general through the city.

**TO CLEAN HAVANA.**  
It is a Task That Will Take Years to Complete Successfully.  
Havana, Dec. 24.—Cuba is feeling the benefits of prospective and actual American administration. Some of the streets are really clean. General Greene had \$50,000 for public sanitation authorized by the department at Washington. But Spanish sovereignty had to be respected, although it was unable to remove the garbage from a single alley. The Havana common council has not a dollar to spend. So by permission of the Spanish authorities the United States took hold of the work. Marquis de Estaban, the alcalde or mayor of the city had prohibitions posted up in which the inhabitants of the streets cleaners were told that it was done by the American government and they were exhorted to second the efforts of the United States military authorities.  
The removal of the accumulations of garbage does not solve the sanitary problem of Havana however. It shows that the streets can be kept fairly clean and the city be made habitable, while the changes that must be made in the sewerage system and other hygienic improvements are carried out. Five years may be necessary before the plans which Colonel George E. Waring prepared can be made effective. That will prevent Havana from being kept clean for the next five months, which is the period in which it is so important to forestall epidemic diseases among the American troops. General Ludlow will probably be appalled by the task before him as military and civil governor of Havana city.

**Cubans Must Behave.**  
Havana, Dec. 26.—American evacuation commissioners will issue a proclamation to the inhabitants of the island of Cuba asking all inhabitants to observe the agreement entered into with Spain and warns all offenders that they will be brought promptly to justice.
