Association Adopted Resolutions Commending Work of the College at San Antonio Meeting.  
The Cattle Raisers Association in their convention recently held in San Antonio passed the following resolutions endorsing the work of the A. and M. College.

"Resolved that we commend the excellent work of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas in fostering and stimulating the live stock industry by inculcating in the youth of our State a love for fine blooded stock by the purchase of high grade types of improved breeds and by the dissemination of information that will prove of economic value to the cattlemen.  
"We endorse the high standard adopted by the Board of Directors in founding the Animal Husbandry Department of the College and we look forward with interest to the results that will accrue to the public. We congratulate the Thirtieth Legislature upon the wisdom of its appropriation for this college and we heartily recommend to the Thirty-first Legislature an appropriation sufficient to maintain the institution to its present high degree of usefulness to the stock raising and farming interests of the State."
