

SPANISH SPOLIATION CLAIMS.

Adding Up a Big Cost Bill Against Uncle Sam.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The Spanish government is preparing a big bill of damages to be presented to the United States on account of the numerous expeditions alleged to have gone from our shores to the relief of the Cuban insurgents. In support of its claim to reparation it intends to invoke the precedent established by the United States against Great Britain in the celebrated Alabama claims awards made by the Geneva arbitration tribunal. There have been reports heretofore that Spain at the proper time would present a series of claims on account of the use the insurgents had made of the United States as a base of supplies for hostile operations in Cuba. These were nothing more than rumors until today when Government officers received copies of a report the Spanish legation made by its legal adviser, Mr. Calderon Carlisle.

MEXICO IN THE SWIM.

Millions to Be Invested.

Mexico City, Aug. 15.—Negotiations are practically concluded by the well known capitalist J. A. Robertson of Monterey for the purchase of all the street railways in that city, which will be provided with electric traction, making the first electric system in this country. A large and finely equipped hotel will also be built at Topo Chico Springs near that city. Same capitalist have also purchased the Monterey Wire and Nail Works in conjunction with the Pittsburg people. This is one of the best industries in the country and is specially favored by tariff. The investment will amount to a quarter of a million dollars. Other large enterprises in association with American capital and which will make Monterey the great manufacturing city in northeastern Mexico, are soon to be concluded.

Mrs. Mary S. Albertson, of Portland, Ore., has just recovered from a trance which lasted a week, during which she would have been buried alive had not a friend noticed what he thought were signs of life. The woman's body was prepared for the tomb and put in a casket. Then, at her friend's solicitation, she was taken out, and partly through natural and partly by artificial means, after a week's effort she was restored to consciousness. Everything was a perfect blank to her except the placing of her body in the casket. She says she was conscious that she was to be buried alive, but was unable to give any sign to prevent that horrible fate.

MARSHALL FIELD'S GIFT ACCEPTED. Chicago Chronicle.

The Field Columbian museum will have a place in the new Lake Front park. The announcement was made Saturday that Marshall Field will give the city or the South park board \$2,000,000 with which to erect a building of sufficient proportions to accommodate the museum now in Jackson park. There will also be a space allotted for a magnificent parade ground and armory for the First, Second and Seventh regiments, or the First brigade of the Illinois national guard. The money for this purpose and the cost of maintaining it is to be raised by the troops, and no expense will fall on the city in this connection.

It was formerly decided to give the museum a site in the center of the new park, at a point about where Congress street, extended, would strike. For this purpose twenty-two acres of ground will be required. At the south end of the new ground, or east of the Illinois Central tracks, the military parade ground and armories for the national guard will be placed. The exact amount of space for this purpose has not been fully determined, but will be settled before the ordinance is passed. Brigadier General Wheeler has the matter in charge, and is to consult with other officers of the militia to-day.

The question of maintaining the property after it is turned over to the park board was also discussed, and it was agreed that the military organizations will have to stand the expense of keeping the parade ground in proper condition, and the directors of the Field Columbian museum will look after that covered by the museum. As most of the ground will be covered by the building of the institution, this will not be a great expense.

A number of milch cows from Oregon were shipped to China on the last trip out of steamer Tacoma. According to the Portland Oregonian, cows are scarce across the water, and the Chinese drive them through the streets and sell the milk by the drink.
