## ATLEE NOMINATED.

Resolutions Against the Fee Bill and for Increase of Ranger Force.

Corpus Christi, Texas, Sept. 12.—At the Democratic senatorial convention of this the Twenty-third senatorial district of Texas, held in this city today, Hon. E. A. Atlee of Laredo was nominated by acclamation and the following resolutions unanimously adopted:

"We hereby reaffirm our allegiance to the Democratic party its principles and platform as enunciated by the convention at Chicago and pledge the party support to all Democratic nominees.

"Second, we hereby heartily endorse the course of our Senator, the Hon. E. A. Atlee, as in all things having proved faithful to the trust reposed in him and in all things entitled to the confidence of our people.

"Third, we hereby instruct our Senator to be nominated by this convention to use every honest means as such to preserve in their integrity our judicial districts as now constituted except it be by request by petition from his Democrats constituents of any given county.

"Fourth, we also hereby instruct our Senator, to be nominated by this convention, to use every honorable means in power to prevent the passage of and bill or resolution affecting or in any way restricting the rights our citizens of Mexican origin as now enjoyed by them under our present laws and constitution.

"We also hereby instruct the Senator from this district to use every honorable means to secure to the sheriffs and all other county officers full and proper compensation for their services and to vote against and in every way endeavor to prevent the passage of any bill or resolution tending to any reduction of said compensation and also to endeavor to secure the repeal of the present law which it repealed, touching the sheriffs' compensation in cases of attached witnesses.

"We also hereby instruct our Senator to endeavor to continue the present ranger force in the field and to secure as large a legislative appropriation in order that said force may be made more efficient and be increased if possible, and such law also as will tend to secure more efficiency in the discharge of their duty by said rangers by a more equal distribution of them and prevent their being stationed too great a length of time at any one point by reason of which their efficiency is often impaired by the local antagonism or sympathies or affiliations which will and do naturally arise from such continued contact with the people of any one locality, and we also especially condemn any interference by such ranger force or any of

them in our local affairs and in the prosecution of minor offense such as misdemeanors, etc., all of which is respectfully submitted."

## GEN. GOMEZ'S DECREE.

Says There Shall Be No Pacificos, Save Helpless Women and Children.

New York, Sept. 12.—A dispatch to the Herald from Havana says: It is the rebels now who are making war upon Cuban pacificos. Under a late decree of Maximo Gomez, the insurgent leader, those who have attempted to preserve a neutral attitude must show their colors and come out openly for one side or the other. Able-bodied men who are non-combatants must take a machete in hand and strike for Cuba and independence or abandon their fields, take refuge within the cities and towns held by government forces and shoulder a rifle in defense of Spain and the crown. Neutrals in future will not be respected in time of war. Gomez says there shall be no pacificos save helpless women and innocent children.

By a strange coincidence he and Captain General Weyler have upon this subject identical ideas, and, stranger still, each is opposed to allowing planters to gather their sugar and cocoa crops until after the war is fought to a finish. From all over the island dispatches bring reports of instances where Gomez's orders are being rigidly carried into effect.

Beyond the Vierbota, but a few leagues from Havana, Ramon Velez, a poor peasant, was dragged from his humble hut, shot and afterward horribly mangled by an insurgent band before the eyes of his wife and children, whose appeals for mercy availed him naught. His crime was failure to obey a previous intimation from the insurgents that he should either join them or move into town.

On the Fortuna estate, near Artemisa, an old widow, with a house full of small children, was driven out of house and home, the torch being applied to the building, while their humble plantings adjacent were destroyed.

In Matanzas province, near Roque, Nicolas Hernandez, a peon employed on La Espana plantation, owned by former Minister Romero Robledo of Madrid, was seized by raiders and hanged to a tree in front of his own door. Andres Redondo, a foreman of the Olympio sugar estate, near Cimarrones, was also taken out a few nights ago by a party of rebels, who left him, dangling from a tree.

At Macun, near Sagua, a number of wood cutters were menaced with the rope in event of an attempt to continue work. In Guabo and Calabazar five coal burners, one a boy of 10 years, have been hanged for persisting in their work in defiance of rebels warnings. Two others were hanged near Quemado de Guinez, and near Caguaguna Don Estanallo Martinez, a rich Creole stockman, was likewise put out of the way. In the vicinity of Santiago de Cuba country people are being held up and robbed upon the public roads.

## GREAT GOLD DISCOVERY.

The Ore Runs From \$200 to \$10,000 a Ton.

Rawlins, Wyo., Sept. 14.—There is much excitement here over a recent gold discovery on Grand Encampment creek, about forty-five miles southeast of this city. The discovery was made by A. H. Huston and Ben Cullen in July. They have kept the matter quiet until the present time. At a depth of twelve feet they have, it is claimed a pay streak twenty inches wide, assaying from \$200 to \$10,000 in gold.

The vein has been traced for several miles. Forty or fifty claims have been located. Numerous parties are preparing to go to the camp as rapidly as they can.

Editor McMicken, who has just returned from the camp, says it is the greatest mineral region in Wyoming or northern Colorado. The camp is in the same mineral zone as Hahn's peak and the North Park mines.

## A BILL DEFEATED.

Paris, Tex., Sept. 12.—A bill disfranchising intermarried whites and freedmen has been defeated in the Choctaw Council, now in session at Tusahoma. Another bill is pending denying them all rights of citizenship. Party feeling is running high.
