**THE SPONGER.**

The Nacogdoches Sentinel delights in taking a fall out of those men who forget their public obligations in their rush to make money for themselves and who have not yet grasped the fact that every moment given and every penny expended for the general good is an investment that is hard to beat. The Sentinel says:

"It is no more trouble for a West Texas town of five or six thousand people to raise a fifty thousand dollar bonus for some big enterprise, than it is for an East Texas city to throw up its hands over high priced products, and spend a fair part of the time in causing the government and things in general. A prominent merchant said yesterday that he couldn't see any future in this place; that it is getting worse every day, and people are leaving it as fast as they can. And a close diagnosis of the case shows that same fellow a merchant with a snug little competence made in this city, a fairly good business now—one who never takes any part in public affairs or contributes a dollar to the upbuilding of the city or section. Hut who—but the solemn truth."

East Texas is not alone in the kind of citizens here described. Every city has more or less of them, some more and some less. The best way to overcome them is for the rest to get so active and to make so much noise about it as to arouse an enthusiasm of the others, or if they are beyond that stage, to make them realize their knocking is senseless and that the world will move without them.—Beaumont Enterprise.

**PROHIBITION BY STATUTE IS ENDORSED.**

The following is clipped from the Dallas News of March 2. Does it prove that C. C. Johnson is "down and out"? He is the only man in the race for governor who stands for the things set forth below. Does the following show that "prohibitionists" are not going to support him? Are the trustees of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas "prohibitionists"? Dr. G. C. Rankin's editorial on "statutory" prohibition appeared in the Home and State of Feb. 25, but the Anti-Saloon League passed the following on March 1st, which was printed in the News:

In somewhat divergent verbiage, but to the same effect, the Anti-Saloon League trustees and central committee declared themselves yesterday, at a three-session meeting here, in favor of statutory prohibition. Beyond this declaration there was no statement which would seem to indicate preference for any announced candidate for Governor.

These resolutions were adopted: "To the President of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas: Your committee on resolutions beg leave to report as follows: The Anti-Saloon League is unalterably opposed to the barroom as a factor in the social, political and business life of Texas and for its eradication we favor:

"1. The submission by the Thirty-Second Legislature of Texas of a constitutional amendment forever prohibiting the manufacture and sale in Texas of intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

"2. That if the Legislature again refuses to give the people of Texas an opportunity to vote on a constitutional amendment we favor the enactment of prohibition by such laws as will rid the State of Texas of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

"3. That so long as the liquor traffic exists by law we are in favor of general principles of all such restrictive legislation as is calculated to reduce the evil of said traffic to a minimum.

"4. That we adopt the foregoing platform and principles and recommend the same to the earnest and thoughtful consideration of our fellow-citizens of Texas in the responsible duty imposed upon them this year, 1910, in the choice of legislators, a Governor, Lieutenant Governor and all other officers of the State."

A majority of those in attendance were avowed C. C. Johnson men, and all who expressed themselves declared the conference to have been a "love feast." The love feast attribute was pronounced more noticeable toward the close of the conference, when, at the suggestion of Dr. George W. Truett, a half hour was devoted to a discussion of matters embraced

under the subject, "Good of the Order."

One of the first efforts of the committee when it met yesterday morning was to secure a copy of the Constitution of Texas. G. A. Paris, editor of the Christian Courier, made a hurried and unsuccessful search for the Constitution, but later a copy was found and was made available for the conference. A copy of the Constitution was needed, it was stated, because of the expressed belief of members of the committee that legislative and sovereignty of the people are convertible terms, and that statutory prohibition is not unconstitutional.

A special committee, composed of D. E. Garrett, R. H. Kirby, J. B. Hambrill, J. Frank Smith and H. W. Vaughan, prepared the resolutions which, after much amendment, were presented in the foregoing form. It developed that much care was taken to avoid the use of the term, "statutory prohibition," because, as some of the committee men said, "the poll taxes have copyrighted the expression."

That only four of the trustees and central committee men—Sanders, Simmons, Carroll and Parfitt—were absent indicates, it is stated, the degree of interest taken in yesterday's conference.

All sessions were executive, and apparently all who assembled behind the closed doors in an assembly room at 284 Commerce street had been "warned" against newspaper men, for all reporters who applied for information were given dissertations on the restrictions of executive conference. Some of the information leaked to reporters, but not pertinently.

The following attended yesterday's meeting: Trustees—J. W. Moore, Beaumont; George C. Hamlin, Dallas; H. A. Bush, Fort Worth; G. A. Paris, J. Frank Smith, George W. Truett, Arthur W. Jones, Epps G. Knight, W. C. Lattimore and J. T. McClure, Dallas; S. L. Hives, McKinney; R. E. Spearman, County Attorney, Hunt County; Central committee men—A. G. Webb, Baird; H. W. Vaughan, District Attorney, Texas; W. H. Kirby, Austin; Col. Tom Thompson, Waxahatchie, and G. F. Boyd, Kyle. The resolutions, which, it is declared, were the sole output of the meeting were adopted unanimously, it was stated. The meeting was called at the instance of J. W. Moore of Beaumont, president of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas.

The Denton Herald preaches good doctrine in the following: "Cooperation between the people of the city and the people of the country is the proper way to develop any locality. The interests are mutual. If the country prospers and develops it helps the town and if the country grows it makes a better market and helps to increase values in the country. There is no good reason for the people of the country being at odds with the people of the town."
