BIG NEGRO DIES GAME

AS BLACK CAP WAS ADJUSTED WAS MUTTERING A PRAYER.

Widow of Frank Wolford and Others See the Trap Sprung—Negro's Neck Was Not Broken.

Dallas, Tex., May 13.—Exactly at 11:30 o'clock this morning Sheriff A. L. Ledbetter sprung the trap of the mafioso of the Dallas county jail and Julius B. alias "Hubert" Robertson, had paid the extreme penalty for the murder of Frank Wolford, the Rose Hill farmer. At twenty-two minutes to 12 o'clock Drs. Frank Hal, T. H. Fisher, W. M. Brimby and K. W. Field pronounced life extinct. At 11:50 o'clock the body was cut down and turned over to the undertaker. The negro went to his death as coolly as though death was the farthest thing from his mind. In fact throughout the whole proceedings he appeared to be about the coolest person among the large number who witnessed the execution.

Among the spectators were Mrs. Frank Wolford, widow of the murdered man, and a number of other relatives. Among these relatives was Ed Gibson, the stepson of Wolford, who was with him when the killing occurred, Violet and Vera, two of Wolford's daughters; W. W. and T. W. Wolford, brothers; R. C. Lutz, a brother-in-law, and several nephews and other relatives. "I would like to pull the trap which will send that negro to eternity," said one of the brothers, just a short time before the march to the gallows began.

After the noose had been adjusted by Sheriff Ledbetter, and while the black cap the big negro's lips were seen to be working. No audible sound came from the lips of the man who was so near death, but it was apparent to all who saw the lips working that he was sending up his last prayer to his maker to have mercy on his soul. While the lips were still working, the black cap was slipped over his head. A moment later the shoes fell from the feet. The platform shot out from under the negro and there was an audible twang which could have been heard in nearly all parts of the jail as the rope tightened and caused by the heavy weight on the other end pulling it taut.

That the fall did not break the negro's neck was indicated by the fact that he appeared to struggle for some little time after the drop. Gradually the rope began to creep, quivering and in a few minutes time the doctors who were grasping the pulse of the negro, pronounced that the pulse was no longer beating. The body, however, was not cut down until ten minutes to 12 o'clock.

Berlin, May 13.—Roosevelt in company with Lieutenant Kirehner, moved this morning to Buch, a suburb, where a colony of 1500 worn-out workmen, men and women, are maintained in relative comfort at the expense of the city of Berlin. The subject of public dependents is being pursued by the former president, who, while in Denmark, investigated a similar institution.

WON'T MOVE TO DALLAS

CONE JOHNSON SAYS HEADQUARTERS WILL REMAIN AT TYLER.

Denied Report That He Would Establish Campaign Headquarters in the City.

Dallas, Tex., May 13.—Hon. Cone Johnson of Tyler, candidate for governor, who spoke at the First Baptist church here last night, left this afternoon at 2:10 o'clock for Whitehouse.

Mr. Johnson remained about the corridors of the Oriental hotel this morning, where he met several friends and discussed things apropos. Among those whom he saw were Hon. Sterling P. Strong, A. J. Knight and others, including his brother, Dr. S. W. Johnson, formerly of Corsicana, but now a citizen of Dallas.

Candidate Johnson denied the report that he would shortly establish campaign headquarters in Dallas. He said this morning that his partner, James I. Edwards, would still have charge of his campaign and that headquarters would be maintained at Tyler.

"The whole matter is in Mr. Edwards' hands," he said. "If he sees fit to remove headquarters to Dallas during the last month of the campaign, he will do so. However, for the present, nothing of the kind has been considered, as far as I know."

BATTLE MAY BE DELAYED

Opposing Factions in Nicaragua Are Preparing for New Conflict.

New Orleans, La., May 13.—The threatened battle between the Estrada and Madriz forces in Nicaragua may not occur for several days as yet, according to advices received here. It is reported that the largest division of Madriz' forces are now encamped at a point about eight miles south of Bluefields. A portion of the invading army has been left at Rama to flank the opposing army of insurgents. It is believed that the Madriz forces are awaiting the arrival of the steamship Venus, said to be fully laden with arms, before beginning a land attack on Bluefields. The Venus sailed from New Orleans April 30 flying a British flag.

Tammany to Greet Him

New York, May 13.—Tammany is to be in force to meet the returning of Colonel Roosevelt. A large committee of sections has been appointed to make the proper plans. A tug probably will be chartered to carry the braves out to sea to greet their one time political foe.

THE PAVING PROPOSITION

TEN MILES OF SMOOTH PAVED STREETS IN THE CITY.

Who Are Entitled to Vote—Opinions of a Number of Leading Citizens.

The election whether the city shall vote \$100,000 bonds with which to pave ten miles of streets will be held Monday, May 16.

There seems to be some misapprehension as to who are legal voters at this election. Some think only owners of real estate can vote, but that is an error. Anyone who pays a tax to the city on anything, watch, piano, sewing machine, is entitled to vote at this election provided he has paid his poll tax or is legally exempt from the poll tax. It is doubtful if anything could be done that would help Greenville as much as the paving of ten miles of streets. Every piece of property in the city will be made more valuable to say nothing of the comfort of paved streets and the decrease of the dust nuisance. There should be practically a unanimous vote for the proposition. Many citizens have expressed themselves on the question and amongst them the following:

J. M. Massey—I am for Greenville—hence for the paving. Believe all the people are entitled to all the good things they can get.

C. G. Hardy—Could offer quite a number of reasons. First, it will help the general appearance of the city, and will fill a long felt want.

J. L. Collins—I have already staked up for over 200 feet of paving on my street—that shows you where I stand. Consider it will be a great benefit to my property and the city in general. I am for Greenville first, last and all the time.

COTTON IS GOING UP

SENSATIONAL ADVANCES ARE RECORDED.

Coming as Top of Upward Movement Assumed Sensational Proportions.

New York, May 13.—There was a very sharp advance in the cotton market today, which, coming on the top of a steady upward movement (since last Monday morning assumed sensational proportions. May contracts touched 15.72 before midday, making a gain of 15 points from the closing figures last night and 774 points from the recent low level.

Other months scored even greater gains with July selling 15.71 and September 13.90, or from 20 to 22 points above the closing figures of last night, while still later deliveries showed advances ranging from 17 to 18 points.
